LCAA Jr. Theatre students produce a play in a week

Show to premiere Saturday

No small feat, the Liberty Center Association for the Arts Jr. Theatre students have produced a comedic play in only one week. They will perform it Saturday evening, Aug. 5 at the Hayden Liberty Center.

Adult advisors Carl and Amber Hutcherson and Chelsea Turner are there to guide the students. Amber Hutcherson noted the students write, rehearse, direct, build, and costume a complete show, culminating in a live performance for an audience at the end of one week.

The show has nine actors, Lillibeth Sokolowski, Tad Peterson, Gabriel Peterson, Aleah Minks, Katherine Kehl, Everett Dick, Adelle Powers, Charlotte Cox, and Carsten Smith. Abbey Bowlin, 18, is the director, and Sophia Sauser is the technician.

"So, we are basically here to just keep them on the rails," Hutcherson noted. "We started with a meet-and-greet at 6 o'clock last Friday, and we did some improv games.

"We found out who was acting and who did the technical stuff," she continued. "And at 7 o'clock, they set to writing a script, and they had a

script written by 6 a.m."

Hutcherson added the students had a lock-in and worked all night to write the script, a comedy, "The Five Shards of Alessandro."

"We did our first read-through that Saturday morning," she explained. "Gave the script to the director, and we had our first rehearsal on Saturday night."

Every day this week, the students built and painted props in the morning and then rehearsed for three hours in the afternoon and three hours each night.

"We are here to guide them through some problems and go 'maybe that's a little too extreme,'" she said with a laugh. "Let's keep this manageable; no, we don't have a camel costume, so, no camels."

She added they are using costumes and other items they already have in stock at LCAA.

Hutcherson said the play begins in a pizzeria, and the students go on a quest through several different time periods.

"It is fun," she said. "You're going to laugh a lot. There are a lot of cultural references that I think a lot of parent-aged people will understand.

"There's some references to 'Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure,'" she continued. "One of them, her dad loves that movie,

so they pulled out the 'be excellent to each other.' I think it's funny, it's goofy and the most important thing is everybody is having a super good time, and the kids are very proud of the work they have done."

She added the process was "incredibly intensive."

"Usually in a show, they are going to see the tech side or they'll see the acting side," Hutcherson

explained. "But in this, (it's) from scratch. So, they've gotten a lot more familiar with the theatrical process — from brainstorming to script writing to workshoping a script into the actual mechanics of how things are done."

She added that the whole experience is excellent for the students and that they can do it in a week is "an adventure" for everyone involved.

Traffic stop and three search warrants lead to nine arrests

A traffic stop and three warrant services Wednesday, Aug. 2 led to the arrests of nine individuals and the seizure of methamphetamine, fentanyl and other dangerous drugs.

Pettis County Sheriff Brad Anders said multiple arrests made for a long day for his team.

"We had staff that remained on duty an extended period of time just dedicated to safe service and fulfillment of those warrants," Anders told the Democrat on Thursday, Aug. 3.

First, at 1:20 a.m., Deputy Moore and K9

Cav made a traffic stop on a vehicle for a traffic violation.

The driver, Mark R. Nelson, attempted to flee but quickly stopped and bailed out, seen dropping a bag of a crystalline substance.

Nelson was safely taken into custody and contact was made with the passenger, Amanda Meyer, who exited the vehicle with a noticeable bulge.

A large bag containing methamphetamine was recovered from Meyer along with the baggie dropped by Nelson. More than 2 ounces of methamphetamine were inside the baggies. Both subjects were transported to the Pettis County Jail.

Nelson has been charged with possession of a controlled substance and tampering with physical evidence. He was issued a \$15,000 bond. Meyer has been charged with second-degree drug trafficking. She was issued a \$100,000 bond. Both had an arraignment Thursday in Pettis County Circuit Court.

Only five hours later, at approximately 6:30 a.m., a search warrant was executed by the Pettis County Sheriff's Office, Mid-Missouri Drug Task Force, and the Sedalia Police Department's Crime Resolution Unit in the 1700 block of South Lamine Avenue.

Evergy prepares customers to switch to time-based rate plans

The Missouri Public Service Commission has ordered all Missouri utilities, including Evergy, to make the switch to time-based rate plans in order to combat the high demand for energy during peak times.

"While customers cannot opt out of the program, Evergy is providing four new rate plans, tailoring pricing plans to best fit customer needs. Missouri residents need to choose their new plan by Oct. 1, 2023," Gina Penzing, Evergy's senior manager of corporate communications, told the Star-Journal. "If they don't, they will be opted into Evergy's new

Standard Peak Saver rate plan. This rate offers discounted electricity prices October through May and all weekend in the summer. Evergy also has the Peak Reward Saver plan, which is very similar to the type of plan customers have today."

With a higher energy demand comes a higher cost to generate electricity. During off-peak hours in the early morning, overnight, and on weekends, less of a demand for energy results in less costs. Shifting usage to off-peak times will help to alleviate the cost to produce energy while also helping to minimize the strain on energy grids.

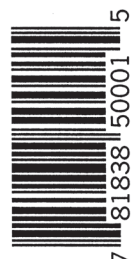
"Evergy customers have the opportunity to save on their monthly energy bills,"

Penzing said. "Time-based rates give customers more control over their energy bills and the ability to reduce costs."

Evergy has resources available for Missouri residents to stay up-to-date on the changes coming this October.

"Customers can log into their account and use the rate comparison tool to see the different plans and pick the one that best fits their household needs and saves them money. Customers will pay less for energy than they do today most times of the day," Penzing said. "By using less energy during those on-peak times, most customers could see their bills slightly drop."

US military may put troops on commercial ships to stop Iran seizures

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — The U.S. military is considering putting armed personnel on commercial ships traveling through the Strait of Hormuz, in what would be an unheard of action aimed at stopping Iran from seizing and harassing civilian vessels, American officials told The Associated Press on Thursday.

Since 2019, Iran has seized a series of ships in the strait, the narrow mouth of the Persian Gulf, as part of its efforts to pressure the West over negotiations regarding its collapsed nuclear deal with world powers. Putting U.S. troops on commercial ships could further deter Iran from seizing vessels — or escalate tensions further.

The contemplated move also would represent an extraordinary commitment in the Mideast by U.S. forces as the Pentagon tries to focus on Russia and China. America didn't even take the step during the so-called "Tanker War," which culminated with the U.S. Navy and Iran fighting a one-day naval battle in 1988 that was the Navy's largest since World War II.

While officials offered few details of the plan, it comes as thousands of Marines and sailors on both the amphibious assault ship USS Bataan and the USS Carter Hall, a landing ship, are on their way to the Persian Gulf. Those Marines and

sailors could provide the backbone for any armed guard mission in the strait, through which 20% of the world's crude oil passes.

Iran's mission to the United Nations did not immediately respond to a request for comment from the AP about the U.S. proposal.

Five U.S. officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss the proposal, acknowledged its broad details. The officials stressed no final decision had been made and that discussions continue between U.S. military officials and America's Gulf Arab allies in the region.

Officials said the Marines and Navy sailors would provide the security only at the request of the ships involved. One official described the process as complex, saying any deployment likely also would require approval of the country under which the ship is flagged and the country under which the owner is registered. So far, that has yet to happen and it might not for some time, the official said.

At the Pentagon, Brig. Gen. Pat Ryder was asked about the plans and would only say that he has no announcements to make on the matter. More broadly, however, he noted that additional ships, aircraft and Marines have been deployed to the Gulf region, making it easier to respond more quickly to any Iranian provocations.

That effort by U.S. and partners, he said, is aimed at ensuring "the Strait of Hormuz remains open, there's freedom of navi-

gation, and that we're deterring any type of malign activity."

And White House National Security Council spokesman John Kirby, speaking to reporters, underscored the importance of the strait and U.S. concerns about Iranian harassment of vessels there.

"The Strait of Hormuz is a vital seaway that has a huge impact on seaborne trade around the world," Kirby said. "It's a critical choke point in the maritime world. And we have seen threats by Iran to affect that choke point."

Earlier Thursday, Vice Adm. Brad Cooper, the head of the Navy's Mid-east-based 5th Fleet, met with the head of the Gulf Cooperation Council. The six-nation bloc includes Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates.

While a statement from the GCC about the meeting did not hint at the proposal, it did say that Cooper and officials discussed "strengthening GCC-U.S. cooperation and working with international and regional partners."

The Bataan and Carter Hall left Norfolk, Virginia, on July 10 on a mission the Pentagon described as being "in response to recent attempts by Iran to threaten the free flow of commerce in the Strait of Hormuz and its surrounding waters." The Bataan passed through the Strait of Gibraltar into the Mediterranean Sea last week on its way to the Mideast.

Already, the U.S. has

sent A-10 Thunderbolt II warplanes, F-16 and F-35 fighters, as well as the destroyer USS Thomas Hudner, and other warships to the region over Iran's actions at sea.

The deployment has captured Iran's attention, with its chief diplomat telling neighboring nations that the region doesn't need "foreigners" providing security. On Wednesday, Iran's paramilitary Revolutionary Guard launched a surprise military drill on disputed islands in the Persian Gulf, with swarms of small fast boats, paratroopers and missile units taking part.

The renewed hostilities come as Iran now enriches uranium closer than ever to weapons-grade levels after the collapse of its 2015 nuclear deal. International inspectors also believe it has enough enriched uranium for "several" nuclear bombs if it chose to build them. Iran maintains its program is for peaceful purposes, and U.S. intelligence agencies assess Tehran is not pursuing an atomic bomb.

The U.S. also has pursued ships across the world believed to be carrying sanctioned Iranian oil. Oil industry worries over another seizure by Iran likely has left a ship allegedly carrying Iranian oil stranded off Texas as no company has yet to unload it.

Missouri budgets \$50M for railroad crossings in response to fatal derailment

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. — Missouri Gov. Mike Parson and state transportation officials on Thursday outlined options for spending the first chunk of \$50 million budgeted for railroad crossing improvements in an effort to prevent tragedies like last year's fatal Amtrak derailment.

The National Transportation Safety Board said Wednesday that poor design contributed to the derailment in the north-central Missouri town of Mendon, which killed four people and injured 146 others.

Recommendations from a \$750,000 study unveiled Thursday suggest changes at 47 public rail crossings on three tracks that carry passenger trains throughout Missouri for a total cost of about \$18.5 million. Total closure is recommended at 17 crossings, including the Mendon site where the crash occurred.

The rest of the \$50 million is planned for improvements at freight train crossings.

The 27 crossings slated for improvements do not have lights, barriers or other alerts to warn drivers when a train is approaching. There are more than 1,400 such crossings throughout Missouri, according to the state Transportation Department.

Spokeswoman Linda Horn said the cost for fixing all passive crossings is estimated at \$700 million.

The Mendon crossing, which was shuttered immediately after last year's crash, also had no lights or signals to warn that a train was approaching.

Before the crash, area residents had expressed concerns for nearly three years about the safety of the crossing because of the lack of visibility.

"Just setting eyes on it, you realize how dangerous it was," NTSB Chair Jennifer Homendy said.

The state Transportation Department had put the \$400,000 project to add lights and gates at the crossing on a priority list, but it hadn't received funding before the derailment.

"Mendon was a wake-up call," Missouri Department of Transportation Director Patrick McKenna told reporters Thursday.

Roughly half of all rail

crossings nationwide — some 130,000 of them — are considered passive without any lights or arms that automatically come down when a train is approaching.

For years, the NTSB has recommended closing passive crossings or adding gates, bells and other safety measures whenever possible. The U.S. Transportation Department recently announced \$570 million in grants to help eliminate railroad crossings in 32 states but that funding will only eliminate a few dozen crossings.

Federal statistics show that roughly 2,000 collisions occur every year at rail crossings nationwide, and last year nearly 250 deaths were recorded in car-train crashes.

Those killed in the Amtrak derailment included the dump truck driver, 54-year-old Billy Barton II, of Brookfield, Missouri, and three passengers: Rochelle Cook, 58, and Kim Holsapple, 56, both of DeSoto, Kansas, and 82-year-old Binh Phan, of Kansas City, Missouri.

The Missouri State Highway Patrol said up to 150 people also were injured.

The Southwest Chief was traveling from Los Angeles to Chicago when it hit the rear right side of the truck near Mendon. Two locomotives and eight cars derailed. The train had 12 crewmembers and 271 aboard.

Following the derailment, several lawsuits were filed against BNSF, a Fort Worth, Texas-based freight railroad that owns and maintains the tracks involved.

Homendy on Thursday said there's shared responsibility between the county, which owns the road, and BNSF.

"But ultimately, it's BNSF's railroad," she said. "It's their rail line, and they have to make sure everybody is safe on that line."

She said the railroad repaired the track within hours of the accident.

"If you can make those improvements to get critical shipments of freight on your rail line, you can also make safety improvements in a quick amount of time," she said.

The railroad in an emailed statement said the track conditions "within BNSF's control" did not contribute to the collision.

Mega Millions jackpot soars to \$1.25B. Here's how hard it is to win

NEW YORK — There's no shaking it. Your chances of winning the lottery are extremely slim.

After no big winner Tuesday night, the Mega Millions jackpot climbed to an estimated \$1.25 billion. If someone wins it all on Friday, when the next Mega Millions drawing takes place, the prize would be one of the largest in U.S. lottery history.

But don't plan on entering a new tax bracket anytime soon. The odds of winning a Mega Millions jackpot — no matter the size — stand at about 1 in 302.6 million. And chances of taking home a top prize for Powerball, which had an estimated jackpot of \$95 million Wednesday, are near 1 in 292.2 million.

Because of the almost impossible chance of winning big, experts stress that you shouldn't spend all your money on lottery tickets. If you choose to play, it's important to be mindful of what you can afford — and maybe consider other places to put your money, even if it's just a few dollars at a time.

Lottery tickets are "definitely not good investments," Matthew Kovach, an assistant professor in Virginia Tech's economics department told The Associated Press last month. "They're not even investments ... there's an expectation you will always lose money."

Here are some things to know about the odds of winning the lottery.

WINNING THE LOTTERY IS NEARLY IMPOSSIBLE. WHAT'S MORE LIKELY?

There's a long list of rare events that are more likely than winning the Mega Millions or Powerball jackpot.

A common comparison is the odds of getting struck by lightning once in your lifetime, which stand at about one in 15,300. Even if you bought a lottery ticket for every drawing over 80 years — two times a week for Mega Millions and three times a week for Powerball — you would still be far less likely to win than to be struck by lightning one time in your life, Syracuse University mathematics professor Steven Diaz said.

"A slightly darker example," Kovach added, is comparing the odds of winning the lottery to getting into a fatal car accident on the way to a store. "Imagine you have to drive half a mile to buy your lottery ticket, so you have a 1 mile round-trip. It's about 4 times as likely that you die in a car accident on the trip to buy your ticket than you are to win," he said.

Of course, both Mega Millions and Powerball offer a handful of tiers below the top jackpots — with the lowest prizes starting at \$2 and \$4, respectfully. For both games, the odds of winning any prize stand at about 1 in 24.

HAS WINNING THE LOTTERY BECOME HARDER?

Yes. Winning the lottery has become harder

in recent years, causing jackpots to grow bigger and bigger — and that's by design.

Such big jackpots comes down to math and more difficult odds. In 2015, the Powerball lottery lengthened the odds of winning from 1 in 175.2 million to 1 in 292.2 million. Mega Millions followed two years later, lengthening the odds of winning the top prize from 1 in 258.9 million to 1 in 302.6 million. The largest lottery jackpots in the U.S. have come since those changes were made.

HOW MUCH DO JACKPOT WINNERS REALLY TAKE HOME?

When someone wins a lottery jackpot in games like Powerball or Mega Millions they have two options: an annuity that is distributed over 29 years or a (significantly smaller) cash payout.

The estimated \$1.25 billion jackpot seen for Mega Millions' Friday drawing, for example, is the annuity option — and the cash value for this prize is nearly half that, standing at \$625.3 million. Most jackpot winners opt for the cash.

Federal and state taxes will also lower the money you take home, with deductions depending on where you live.

IS BUYING A LOTTERY TICKET A GOOD INVESTMENT?

Because winning is so rare, experts maintain that lottery tickets are horrible investments — but note that every person's reason for playing the lottery is different.

Some people might buy a \$2 lottery ticket as a form of entertainment and find satisfaction in "the excitement of thinking you might win," Diaz said. Meanwhile, others may enter the lottery out of feelings of desperation or financial struggle — with experts pointing to consequences that have disproportionately impacted low-income communities.

The lottery has historically acted as a regressive tax on the poor, meaning the people that can least afford to lose their money buy the most tickets, Lia Nower, a professor and the director of the Center for Gambling Studies at Rutgers University, previously told The AP.

She said her "concern with lottery is really more people who are buying it every day or two or three times a week" as opposed to those who purchase one ticket as the jackpot nears \$1 billion.

A \$2 ticket may not seem like much — but it can add up for those who are regularly entering the lottery over time. Alternative spending options could include opening an investment account that allows you to invest in small amounts or buying partial stock, Kovach said.

"In reality, it's probably best to diversify by something like an index fund — but if you're just starting out, I would... (suggest putting it) in the stock market or something like that," he said. "You will actually probably see a return over time."

Wisdom for parents

The proverbs of the Bible are the treasure trove of wisdom for all humanity. They teach us how God has designed the world, what is right and what leads to the good life. It is the well that parents should go to every day to instruct themselves and their children in the wisdom of God.

As you begin teaching and memorizing the proverbs, you must properly understand how to read them so you avoid confusion and disappointment. The confusion around the proverbs comes when you assume that a proverb equals a promise. If “a soft answer turns away wrath,” as Proverbs 15:1 says, then why does whispering to your sister not stop her from yelling at you? US wants Kenya to lead a force in Haiti with 1,000 police

NAIROBI, Kenya — As the U.S. government was considering Kenya to lead a multinational force in Haiti, it was also openly warning Kenyan police officers against violent abuses. Now 1,000 of those officers might head to Haiti to take on gang warfare.

It's a challenging turn for a police force long accused by rights watchdogs of killings and torture, including gunning down civilians during Kenya's COVID-19 curfew. One local group confirmed that officers fatally shot more than 30 people in July, all of them in Kenya's poorest neighborhoods, during opposition-called protests over the rising cost of living.

“We are saddened by the loss of life and concerned by high levels of violence, including the use of live rounds” during those protests, the U.S. said in a joint statement with 11 other nations in mid-July.

Now the U.S., as this month's president of the U.N. Security Council, is preparing to put forward a resolution to authorize a mission in Haiti led by Kenyan police, who have relatively little overseas experience in such large numbers and don't speak French, which is used in Haiti.

“This is not a traditional peacekeeping force,” the U.S. ambassador to the U.N., Linda Thomas-Greenfield, said Tuesday.

For more than nine months, the U.N. had appealed unsuccessfully for a country to lead an effort to restore order to the poorest nation in the Western Hemisphere.

Kenya's interest was an-

nounced on Saturday, with its foreign minister saying his government has “accepted to positively consider” leading a force in Haiti and sending 1,000 police officers to train the Haitian National Police, “restore normalcy” and protect strategic installations.

“Kenya stands with persons of African descent across the world,” Alfred Mutua said. A ministry spokesman didn't respond to questions about the force or what Kenya would receive in return.

U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken on Tuesday praised Kenya for simply considering to serve, a sign of the difficulty in mustering international forces for Haiti, where deadly gang violence has exploded since the 2021 assassination of President Jovenel Moise.

Some organizations that have long tracked alleged police misconduct in Kenya are worried.

“We had some consultations with Kenyan (civil society organizations) last week and there was general consensus that Kenya should not be seen to be exporting its abusive police to other parts of the world,” Otsieno Namwaya, Kenya researcher with Human Rights Watch, told The Associated Press.

Kenya's security forces have a yearslong presence in neighboring Somalia to counter Islamic extremists — a deadly threat that some Kenyans say should keep police at home — and troops have been in restive eastern Congo since last year. Past U.N. peacekeeping deployments include Sierra Leone.

But while other African nations including Rwanda, Ghana and Egypt have thousands of personnel in U.N. peacekeeping missions,

Kenya has less than 450, according to U.N. data. Just 32 are police officers. The U.S. has a total of 35 personnel in U.N. peacekeeping missions.

“I have no knowledge of any complaints raised by the U.N. during those deployments, hence no concern on my end,” the executive director of the watchdog Independent Medico-Legal Unit, Peter Kiama, told the AP. “Remember, the major challenges regarding policing practices in Kenya include political interference with police command and independence, inadequate political will to reform the institution, culture of internal impunity and criminality, and inadequate internal and external accountability.”

With the Haiti deployment, Kenyan police would likely be in charge instead of answering to a U.N. force commander as in traditional peacekeeping missions.

Haitian Prime Minister Ariel Henry on Tuesday said he spoke with Kenyan President William Ruto to thank Kenyans for the “demonstration of fraternal solidarity.” Kenya plans to send a task force in the coming weeks to assess the mission's operational requirements.

“We have to find someone who can help us,” one Port-au-Prince resident, Benice Pierre, said Wednesday.

At home, Kenya's police force has received millions of dollars in training and support from the U.S., European Union and other partners in recent years, with Washington focusing on “promoting police accountability and professionalism.”

But last week, Kenya's National Assembly saw a shouted debate, along with demands for a moment of silence, over police actions

during the recent protests.

“The kind of brutality that has been meted out on innocent and unarmed civilians in the last couple of months has been unprecedented,” minority leader Opiyo Wanyo said. “Those youth that you are killing require jobs, not bullets.”

Kenya's leading opposition party has threatened to gather evidence to submit to the International Criminal Court.

In response, Interior Minister Kithure Kindiki said that police have remained “neutral, impartial and professional.” The ministry referred questions about alleged abuses to the police, who haven't responded.

Ruto, elected president a year ago, at first praised police for their conduct during the protests, but later warned officers against extrajudicial killings as a public outcry grew.

Problems with Kenya's police force have long been acknowledged, even by officials.

The National Police Service “does not have a ‘shoot to kill’ policy,” its inspector general, Hilary Mutyambai, said in a submission to a parliamentary inquiry on extrajudicial killings and enforced disappearances released in late 2021.

But the government-created Independent Policing Oversight Authority told the inquiry it had received 95 cases of alleged deaths because of police action in the previous seven months alone, noting “continuous abuse of force and firearms occasioning deaths.”

A commissioner with the authority said last month that police weren't even reporting deaths to the body as required, which is illegal.

Judge assigned to Trump case is tough punisher of Capitol rioters

WASHINGTON — The federal judge assigned to the election fraud case against former President Donald Trump has stood out as one of the toughest punishers of rioters who stormed the U.S. Capitol in an attack fueled by Trump's baseless claims of a stolen election. She has also ruled against him before.

U.S. District Judge Tanya Chutkan, a former assistant public defender who was nominated to the bench by President Barack Obama, will oversee the case accusing Trump of trying to overturn his 2020 election loss in the two months leading up to the

violent assault on the U.S. Capitol by his supporters.

Chutkan has often handed down prison sentences in Jan. 6, 2021, riot cases that are harsher than Justice Department prosecutors recommended.

Chutkan has also ruled against Trump before in a separate Jan. 6 case. In November 2021, she refused his request to block the release of documents to the U.S. House's Jan. 6 committee by asserting executive privilege.

She rejected his arguments that he could hold privilege over documents from his administration even after President Joe Biden had cleared the way for the National Archives to turn the papers over. She wrote that Trump could not claim his privi-

lege “exists in perpetuity.”

In a memorable line from her ruling, Chutkan wrote, “Presidents are not kings, and Plaintiff is not President.”

Trump made his first court appearance on Thursday before Magistrate Judge Moxila A. Upadhyaya. Such judges handle initial matters in federal cases.

Chutkan has sentenced at least 38 people convicted of Capitol riot-related crimes. All 38 received prison terms, ranging from 10 days to over five years, according to an Associated Press analysis of court records.

She is one of two dozen judges in Washington, D.C., who collectively have sentenced nearly 600 defendants for their roles in

the Jan. 6 siege. More than one third of them avoided sentences that included incarceration.

Other judges typically have handed down sentences that are more lenient than those requested by prosecutors. Chutkan, however, has matched or exceeded prosecutors' recommendations in 19 of her 38 sentences. In four of those cases, prosecutors weren't seeking any jail time at all.

Chutkan has said prison can be a powerful deterrent against the threat of another insurrection.

“Every day we're hearing about reports of anti-democratic factions of people plotting violence, the potential threat of violence, in 2024,” she said in December 2021 be-

fore sentencing a Florida man who attacked police officers to more than five years behind bars. At the time, that sentence was the longest for a Jan. 6 case.

“It has to be made clear that trying to violently overthrow the government, trying to stop the peaceful transition of power and assaulting law enforcement officers in that effort is going to be met with absolutely certain punishment,” she said.

Judge Trevor McFadden, a Trump nominee, suggested during a hearing in 2021 that the Justice Department was being too hard on those who broke into the Capitol compared with the people arrested during racial injustice protests following George Floyd's 2020 murder.

Without naming her colleague, Chutkan criticized McFadden's suggestion days later.

“People gathered all over the country last year to protest the violent murder by the police of an unarmed man. Some of those protesters became violent,” Chutkan said during an October 2021 hearing.

“But to compare the actions of people protesting, mostly peacefully, for civil rights, to those of a violent mob seeking to overthrow the lawfully elected government is a false equivalency and ignores a very real danger that the Jan. 6 riot posed to the foundation of our democracy.”

Shyanne Meyer, Bobbie Jo Williams, and Kristi E. Tittsworth were taken into custody. After the scene was secured, a search yielded paraphernalia including pipes and scales, approximately 6 grams of methamphetamine, a bag of fentanyl weighing just under 1 gram, and alprazolam. Shyanne Meyer has been charged with second-degree drug trafficking and two counts of possession of a controlled substance. She was not issued a bond. Williams and Tittsworth have both been charged with possession of a controlled substance. Williams was issued a \$10,000 bond and Tittsworth received a \$7,500 bond. All three had an arraignment Thursday in Pettis County Circuit Court.

Just 15 minutes later, a second search warrant was served by the sheriff's office, Mid-Missouri Drug Task Force, and SPD's Crime Resolution Unit in the 2500 block of South Ingram Avenue.

Upon securing the residence, Melissa Clark and Jonathan Johnson were taken into custody.

A search of the residence yielded more than 2 ounces of methamphetamine and alprazolam. Assorted paraphernalia including scales and pipes were also seized. Clark has been charged with two counts of possession of a controlled substance and issued a \$25,000 bond. Johnson has also been charged with two counts of possession of a controlled substance. He was issued a \$100,000 bond. Both had arraignments Thursday. Six hours later, a 12:55 p.m. search warrant was executed by the sheriff's office, Mid-Missouri Drug Task Force, and SPD's Crime Resolution Unit in the 1200 block of Elm Hills Boulevard. Skyler Zane and Alex Zeiler were taken into custody and a search of the residence yielded more than approximately 60 counterfeit fentanyl pills and assorted paraphernalia including pipes and scales. Two bags of what is believed to be fentanyl were located in Zane's body cavity via the Pettis County Jail's body scanner. Zane and Zeiler have both been charged with second-degree drug trafficking and two counts

of possession of a controlled substance. Both were issued no bond. "It has been an ongoing investigation for those residences," Anders explained. "There, of course, has been complaints come in on activity at the area, and something that our drug task force was able to look into and build probable cause to get search warrants issued." During one warrant service, an individual was found in active overdose and was treated and transported to receive medical attention by the Pettis County Ambulance District. "It is a grave concern for this community and our agency on the fentanyl issue that seems to be growing here in Pettis County," Anders said. "So we are tackling that with every effort to create a safer community. I am extremely proud of the collective law enforcement officers and PCAD personnel that have worked to save a life today. I am also proud of the deputies and corrections officers who have worked tirelessly in the service of these warrants and location of dangerous substances."

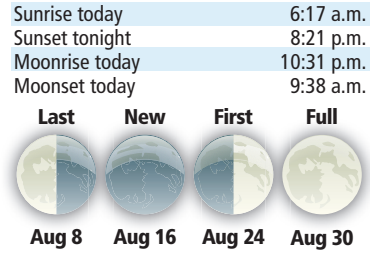

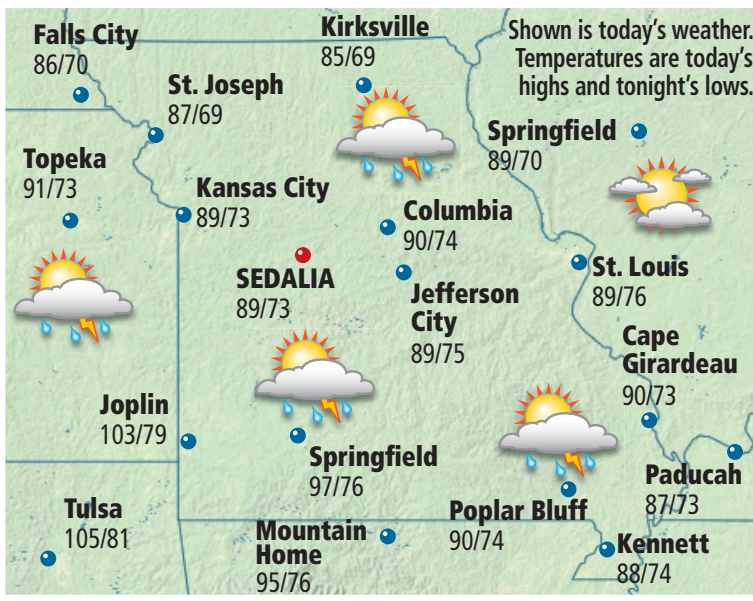

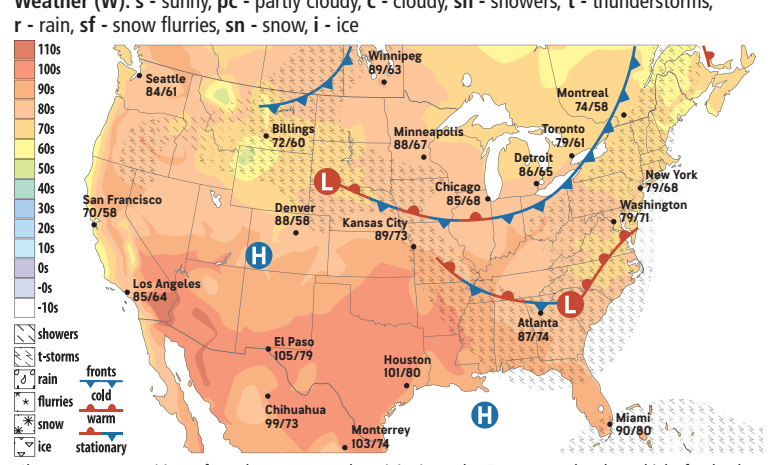

Brutal summer in US is climate wake-up call for many

Veronica Iordanova remembers Octobers growing up in Arizona when it was too cold to trick-or-treat in a short-sleeved Halloween costume. She can't imagine that anymore.

The summer heat lasts longer and feels more intense now, and she knows that is a result of human-caused global warming. She worries about her and her family's future.

"We need to realistically look at the situation and realize it's not going to get better," said Iordanova, who lives in Tempe.

Across the U.S., many people are living through one of the most brutal summers of their lives. And some psychologists believe the attention on a cascade of record-shattering heat, wildfire smoke, extreme flooding and Jacuzzi-hot ocean water could be "another turning point" in efforts to raise awareness about the everyday impact of climate change, as Cornell University climate scientist Natalie Mahowald put it. That's a crucial step to prompt collective action on global warming.

The recognition that human-caused climate change is already contributing extreme weather has been gaining traction for a few years now among Americans.

"This definitely feels like we're in that point of no return that people have talked about for a long time," said Stephen Escudero of Miami, who says this has been the worst summer he's ever seen in his 38 years living there.

For years, Anthony Leiserowitz, the director of the Yale Program on Climate Change Communication, was unable to see any sign in the data that extreme weather was influencing Americans to think differently about climate change. That started changing around 2016, he said, when more people started connecting their experiences of extreme heat and drought with broader climate patterns.

A majority of people in the U.S. understand that climate change is real and caused at least in part by human activity. Over half of the general public say extreme weather that they've experienced was at least partly a result of climate change, according to an AP-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research poll. Yale's polling asks about personal experiences using a different measure and finds that 44% of people say they have personally experienced global warming.

Leiserowitz notes that an extremely small yet vocal climate-denying minority can tend to dominate the discourse — Iordanova and Escudero expressed that they feel alone in their beliefs about climate change even though they're in the majority, and public sentiment has been gradually moving in their direction over time.

However, "there's still a long way to go before Americans have fully understood what's happening here" with climate change, Leiserowitz said.

Sometimes personal experiences end up being a more compelling measure than peer-reviewed research.

"Back then I was like, oh, my gosh, you know, climate change, that's horrible," said Paul Bowyer, who grew up in Arizona and now alternates his time between Northern California and Costa Rica. He said that he used to be interested in the messages coming from political figures like Al Gore, but over time, the urgency faded away and left him feeling like he hadn't seen too much difference in the weather.

"The thing is, nothing has changed," he said. Though he acknowledged that this year brought the worst snowstorm he's ever seen after years of drought — 5 feet of snow on his deck was "not normal," he said — he interpreted that as an act of Mother Nature to "replenish" things rather than as anything too concerning.

Still, some researchers think as more people experience extreme weather, more will change their minds in the opposite direction of Bowyer. Leiserowitz pointed out that extreme heat is powerful because it's easier to connect with the concept of "global warming," even though that warming also contributes to less intuitively-connected events like stronger hurricanes, more intense rainfall and other wacky weather.

And highly visible events in places where they're not normally expected — like heat waves in places without air conditioning infrastructure, or wildfire smoke on the East Coast and in the Midwest — can be more noticeable to people. When threatened by natural disasters, "even for people who aren't willing to call it climate change, they're willing to say like, 'there's a problem and I want to protect my home,'" said Kaitlin Raimi, an associate professor of public policy at the University of Michigan who teaches a course on the psychology of climate change.

Mahowald noted that boilerplate scientific methods are now allowing researchers to more quickly and reliably connect short-term extreme weather events and long-term climate patterns. But minds won't change overnight, because beliefs about climate change can be deeply tied to long-held notions of personal identity.

"What I keep hoping to see is a more nuanced understanding of how difficult it is to change beliefs and a way to help people make that bridge, to close that gap," said Barbara Hofer, a professor emerita of psychology at Middlebury College.

Monica Castellanos, a student in Miami, said that she feels sad when she thinks about people who aren't open to accepting climate science. "More of the older generations are just like, 'ah no, it's just hot. Like no, the planet's dying,'" she said. "A lot of people don't seem to take it seriously."

But Gale Sinatra, a professor of education and psychology at the University of Southern California who co-wrote a book on science denial with Hofer,

highlighted the fact that many people have been exposed to climate change misinformation for a long time.

"It isn't really individuals' faults if they hear climate change is a hoax, they hear it's a conspiracy," Sinatra said. "They've been sort of introduced to those views systemically by bad actors who are specifically trying to obfuscate the problem, usually for financial or sometimes political gain."

The real psychological test for the coming decades will be to see whether personal experiences cause people not only embrace the science of climate change but also

to take action in addressing it.

"Emotions can be a barrier because we want to disconnect from things that make us uncomfortable," she said, but they can also "be leveraged to in a more positive way, get us engaged in activities that are motivating us towards solutions."

ACL injury sets back, springs forward former Lincoln standout Beaman

Former Lincoln standout Jackson Beaman had his summer of baseball end a bit early this year, this time on his own terms.

It's been a rollercoaster 12 months for the outfielder, also an All-State footballer when he played for the Cardinals. Playing last summer for the Bismarck Larks of the Northwoods League, one which counts Max Scherzer, Ben Zobrist and Paul DeJong among its alum, Beaman had nearly wrapped up a decent campaign in North Dakota, hitting .278 with five home runs and 26 RBIs in 43 games.

However, on the final play of a game played on Aug. 4 against the Eau Claire Express in Wisconsin, Beaman caught an out in foul territory, but suffered an injury while making the throw home. The Larks lost in walk-off fashion, 8-7.

"I'm down on the field, felt a couple pops and could tell something didn't feel quite right, but I wasn't in any pain, really," Beaman said. "I caught it, the guy tagged, and as I fell, I realized something was hurt and sailed the throw. Our whole team's off the field and I'm laying in the bullpen and kind of knew something wasn't right."

Initially, the trainer told Beaman it was a hyperextended knee, but after they got him off the field, he was able to get an MRI at the local orthopedic center in Eau Claire. The next day, a call from the doctor revealed the news that he'd torn both his ACL and meniscus. "My heart kind of stopped," he said. "I was in denial, in shock, and it never really hit me until I called my dad and told him."

He was probably right to be in denial. Part of a Final Four team his freshman year at Lincoln, Beaman and a very talented Cards

Singer throws 3-hitter, Royals pound Mets 9-2 for series sweep

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Brady Singer is starting to look like the promising young pitcher that was at times dominant last season, and Bobby Witt Jr. is starting to make good on the expectations that many placed on him as one of baseball's top prospects.

Together, they're making the last-place Kansas City Royals look like a winning ballclub.

Singer tossed eight innings of three-hit ball Thursday, and Witt joined Drew Waters in hitting homers, helping the suddenly hot Royals blow out the free-falling New York Mets 9-2 to wrap up their second straight series sweep.

The last-place Royals had won just four of their first 33 series this season. But leaning on their young stars, they squeaked out three wins over Minnesota before taking three from the Mets, a club they had never swept

in franchise history.

"It just shows you what we're capable," said Witt, who got off to a poor start to this season. "The guys are really buying in."

Singer (7-8), who also got off to a dismal start, allowed singles in the second, fourth and fifth and didn't walk a batter while cruising through the New York lineup. He did not allow a run while striking out four and throwing exactly 100 pitches.

Raiders likely to distribute RB touches even if Jacobs returns

HENDERSON, Nev. — Josh Jacobs' absence in training camp has created opportunities for the Las Vegas Raiders' other running backs to show they should be a major part of the rotation this season. They better take advantage of it.

Coach Josh McDaniels shot down the notion the Raiders likely would go with a more equitable distribution of carries even if the NFL's leading rusher last season is back in the lineup. Jacobs is sitting out after not agreeing to a long-term contract.

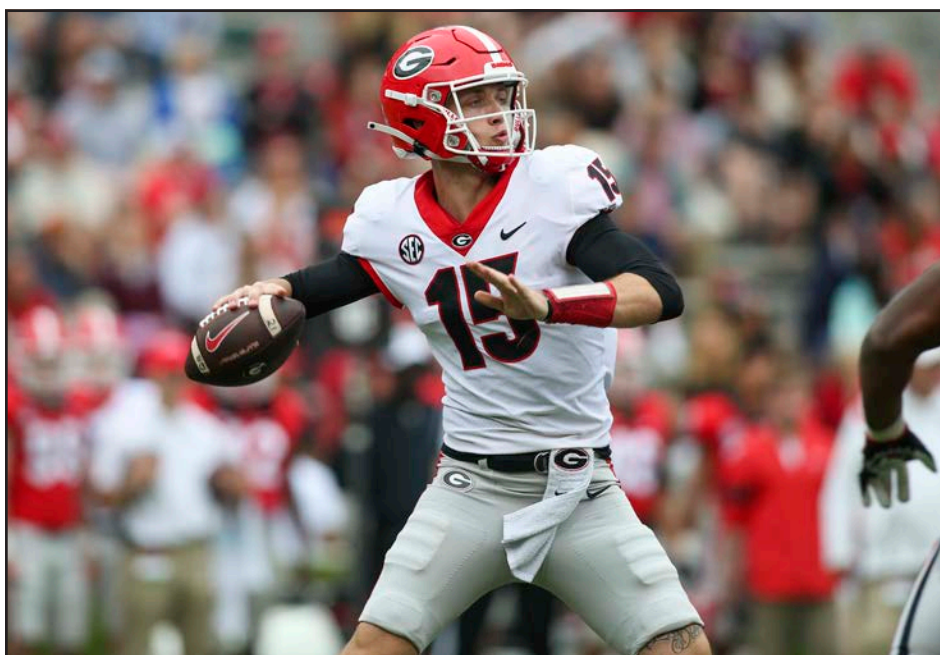

Georgia begins practice, quest for historic three-peat after tumultuous offseason

ATHENS, Ga. — When Javon Bullard was asked about the play that might have saved Georgia's season — last season, that is — he was in no mood to talk.

He already has moved on, his focus firmly fixed on what's ahead.

"To be honest, that play happened in December," Bullard told reporters. "If you're still talking about it, that's not my fault."

That's just the sort of attitude coach Kirby Smart wants to hear from his players, and it might very well carry the Bulldogs to an accomplishment that no other school has done before, at least not in the poll era of college football.

Three straight national championships. After a tumultuous, tragic offseason, the Bulldogs opened preseason practice Thursday on the doorstep of history, having become just the 12th team to win

back-to-back titles since the founding of The Associated Press poll in 1936.

No one has pulled off a three-peat.

Georgia might not have been in this position if not for a huge hit that Bullard delivered to Ohio State's star receiver, Marvin Harrison, during last season's Peach Bowl.

Instead of Harrison making a touchdown catch that would've put the Bulldogs in a 17-point hole late in the third quarter, Bullard's crunching hit jarred the ball loose, held the Buckeyes to a field goal and knocked Harrison out of the game.

Georgia rallied in the fourth quarter for a 42-41 victory and advanced to the national championship game, where the Bulldogs demolished TCU with a record-setting 65-7 blowout.

The Ohio State faithful are still moaning about Bullard's hit, which initially was flagged as targeting but wound up being ruled a clean blow after a review of the replay.

Michael Jordan's sale of Hornets' ownership finalized

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — A new era has begun for the Charlotte Hornets, raising hope that one day the struggling franchise might turn things around. Gabe Plotkin and Rick Schnall officially acquired the majority stake of the Hornets from six-time NBA champion Michael Jordan on Thursday, bringing new thoughts and ideas on how to rebuild a franchise that hasn't been to the playoffs in the last seven seasons.

Plotkin said he and Schnall plan to be "patient" NBA owners, but they are driven to build a winner in Charlotte.

"We think ultimately this is a top-10 or top-15 franchise in the NBA in terms of attractiveness," Plotkin said. "It's our job to produce winning basketball. Winning takes a lot of structure and it doesn't happen overnight. We'll try to position the business for success over the long term and try to make smart decisions."

Plotkin said there will be a focus on analytics, player development, strategy and sports performance. A renovated arena and a state-of-the-art practice facility are also in the near future, which Plotkin believes will help in developing and attract-

ing players — and ultimately mean more wins.

Jordan never could build a consistent winner in Charlotte.

During his 13-year tenure as majority owner, the Hornets went 423-600 and never won a playoff series.

Jordan did not attend the news conference, but he said in news release that it was a "tremendous honor" to own the Hornets.

He didn't give an explanation as to why he sold the franchise.

"As I transition into a minority ownership role, I'm thrilled to be able to pass the reins to two successful, innovative and strategic leaders in Gabe and Rick," Jordan said. "I know the Hornets organization is in great hands moving forward. I'm excited about the future of the team and will continue to support the organization and the community in my new role in the years ahead."

Schnall said he's glad Jordan plans to remain on as a minority owner — and he wants to repay him with a championship.

"He's the greatest basketball player of all time and he has been an incredible partner to us during this negotiation and he has set this business up for future success," Schnall said. "He's not leaving and will be around here for a long

time with us as a partner."

One of the criticisms of Jordan from fans has been his lack of spending in free agency.

Plotkin said the Hornets may need to focus on player development first, while also building a winning culture that will attract big-name free agents down the road.

"It's a great city, a great climate and the ease of getting around here is wonderful," Plotkin said. "I think those things will happen. I don't think there is one route or the other, but I think ultimately player development will be a great focus, and if the opportunity is there for free agency, we will pursue that, too."

Added Schnall: "If we can create a winning culture that people want to be around with high-character kids on our team who want to be part of it, we should have great success in attracting free agents over time."

Schnall said he and Plotkin own "similar stakes" in the franchise, but he wouldn't say who owns more.

They will treat it as an equal partnership.

That means they will rotate the team's governorship every five years, beginning first with Schnall.

Plotkin and Schnall may not be household names like Jordan, but both have

experienced plenty of success in the business world and are huge basketball junkies. Schnall first met Jordan 20 years ago at the former Chicago Bulls star's fantasy basketball camp, where he forged a relationship with the 14-time All-Star.

Schnall has been a minority owner of the Atlanta Hawks and was involved in various aspects of the Hawks' team-building process as well as the renovations to State Farm Arena. He is co-president of Clayton, Dubilier & Rice LLC, where he has worked for 27 years.

Plotkin, the founder and chief investment officer of Tallwoods Capital LLC, acquired a minority stake in the Hornets in 2019 before purchasing a majority stake.

Both men previously served as alternate governors on the NBA Board of Governors.

The Hornets' new ownership group also includes Chris Shumway, Dan Sundheim, Ian Loring, Andrew Schwartzberg, Dyal Home Court Partners, North Carolina natives recording artist J. Cole and country music singer-songwriter Eric Church, and several local Charlotte investors, including Amy Levine Dawson and Damian Mills, among others.

"We're riding high and we should be," Singer said. "Six in a row. Just keep doing what we're doing."

Carlos Carrasco (4-5) allowed all six runs on eight hits and a walk over six innings in another poor start for the Mets. The right-hander has followed up eight shut-out innings in Arizona on July 6 by allowing 21 earned runs in his last four starts.

Francisco Lindor provided the Mets' only offense with a two-out, two-run homer in the ninth.

"Our guys are motivated. They have a lot of professional pride," Mets manager Buck Showalter said. "I can rattle off four or five things I was proud of today but I know nobody wants to hear of them when it's 9-2."

The series-ending romp

wrapped a tumultuous week for the Mets, who traded Max Scherzer and Justin Verlander as part of a stunning selloff that also included closer David Robertson, and outfielders Tommy Pham and Mark Canha.

Meanwhile, the Royals (35-75) completed just the fifth perfect homestand of at least six games in franchise history.

"We'll take them whenever they come, right?" Royals manager Matt Quattraro said. "I mean, obviously we've got ourselves in an enormous hole record-wise, but like we've talked about all year, the effort has been there. The intensity of the work and all those things. So it's nice to see some rewards coming for the guys."

Witt got their offense started with a single in the first inning, then he stole second for his 31st of the season, before trotting home when Salvador

Perez doubled off the wall to give Kansas City the early lead.

The Royals continued to put pressure on the Mets with their baserunning in the third. Samad Taylor beat out an infield single, swiped second — that made Kansas City 13 for 13 on stolen base attempts on the homestand — and reached third on a wild pitch before a high sacrifice fly by Maikel Garcia gave the Royals a 2-0 lead.

Witt followed with his first-pitch, 425-shot to straightaway centerfield.

Morocco advances, Germany exits in wild World Cup group stage finale

SYDNEY — In a wild finale to the group stage of the Women's World Cup, two-time champion Germany was eliminated on Thursday and the second lowest-ranked team in the tournament, Morocco, advanced to the knockout stage.

Colombia also advanced as Group H winner to round off a slew of upsets in the opening weeks of the competition being held in Australia and New Zealand.

A day earlier, Jamaica eliminated another favorite, Brazil, to advance to the round of 16, while South Africa is also through to the next stage after its stoppage-time winner against Italy.

But Germany's early exit after a 1-1 draw with South Korea stands out as the biggest shock in a tournament full of surprises.

"I can't explain what happened today. ... The disappointment is huge, I can't put it into words," Germany midfielder Lena Oberdorf said.

Ranked No. 2 by FIFA, the runner-up at last year's European Championship

was one of the favorites to win the World Cup. And after opening the tournament with a 6-0 rout of Morocco, the Germans looked certain to cruise through a group that included Colombia and South Korea.

But a 2-1 loss against Colombia, followed by the draw against South Korea, saw it fail to advance from the group stage at a Women's World Cup for the first time. Cho So-hyun fired South Korea ahead in the sixth minute and despite Alexandra Popp's equalizer in the 42nd, Germany couldn't find a winner.

Morocco advanced as runner-up in Group H after back-to-back 1-0 wins against South Korea and Colombia.

Germany's failure has echoes of the men's team, which has been eliminated in the group stage at each of the last two editions of the men's World Cup.

Some German players draped coats over their heads in a bid to hide their faces as they left the field in Brisbane on Thursday. Popp, Germany's captain, had tears in her eyes. She exits the tournament despite being the joint leading scorer on four goals with Japan's

Hinata Miyazawa,

Other players looked into the distance in disbelief.

Those scenes were in sharp contrast to the joy witnessed in Perth after Morocco, ranked 72nd, secured a place in the round of 16 on its debut at the World Cup.

Only Zambia, No. 77, came into the tournament with a lower ranking than Morocco, which had already made history by becoming the first Arab team to register a win at the Women's World Cup by beating South Korea in its second game.

The Moroccans quickly followed that up with another victory against Colombia to advance. Anissa Lahmari's penalty in first-half stoppage time was the only goal of the game.

Morocco also made history at the men's World Cup in Qatar last year by becoming the first African team to advance to the semifinals.

The women's team will face France in the round of 16, while Colombia takes on a Jamaica team that has also upset the odds.

After holding France to a 0-0 draw in its opening game, Jamaica also shut out Brazil on Wednesday

to leave the Copa America champion stunned.

"This shows, you can see with your very own eyes, that the women's game is kicking things up a notch," France coach Herve Renard said in response to that result.

The established nations, it seems, will have to get used to a leveling of the playing field in women's soccer.

Two-time defending champion United States came within the width of the post from going out in the group stage against Portugal. Olympic champion Canada was eliminated after finishing third in Group B.

The latest edition of the Women's World Cup is its biggest yet after the tournament was expanded to 32 teams, up from 24.

There were fears that would dilute the quality and lead to more one-sided games.

But while there have been routs in the group stages, it has been notable how many underdogs have upset or pushed the favored nations.

There is also no longer the escape route of third-placed teams advancing to the knockout stage, with only the top two in each group qualifying.

Taurasi's next WNBA milestone is breaking 10,000-point barrier

Diana Taurasi is an icon in the world of hoops, and the perennial All-Star known as the "White Mamba" is on the cusp of another milestone in her illustrious WNBA career.

She is closing in on becoming the first player in league history to score 10,000 points in the regular season. But like most of the greats in any sport, Taurasi says she has always cared more about winning than milestones and records.

"I really don't think about the number, I really don't," Taurasi said after scoring 29 points in a one-point loss to Indiana on Tuesday night. "I've always said I've just played basketball because I love to play. Literally the only reason why I keep showing up to the gym right now is because I still love to play and you know, this group still shows up every day."

The group is showing up but not winning. Although Taurasi has been focused on trying to salvage a losing year for the only WNBA team she's played for, it's impossible to ignore the looming milestone.

Taurasi is just 18 points away from 10,000, which would put her 2,512 ahead of second-place Tina Thompson. Taurasi, who has averaged 19.1 points during her career, got her first chance at the milestone Thursday night against Atlanta.

DeWanna Bonner is the next closest active player on the list. The nearly 36-year-old Connecticut Sun forward is nearly 3,300 points behind Taurasi.

"What she's been able to do for such a long period of

time has been truly incredible," said Bonner, who played with Taurasi for the first 10 years of her career in Phoenix. "I've seen firsthand how hard she works and what she's done and it's amazing."

Current WNBA scoring leader Jewell Loyd has 4,458 points in her nine-year career. It would take her another 277 games if she averaged 20 points a game to reach the 10,000-point mark. Despite the fact the league has expanded its schedule to 40 games each

year, Loyd doesn't think she'd be playing long enough to score that many points.

The 41-year-old Taurasi doesn't remember most of her points, although the game in which she broke Thompson's mark in 2017 will always be special because it was in her hometown of Los Angeles and the late Kobe Bryant was there. Taurasi broke Thompson's record on a layup and after the game, Bryant dubbed her "White Mamba" as a spinoff of his moniker "Black Mamba."

IndyCar Series moving season finale, awards to Nashville starting in 2024

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — IndyCar loves racing through the streets of Music City so much that the series is making Nashville the final race of the season and the stage for its annual awards starting in 2024.

Mark Miles, president and CEO of Penske Entertainment Corp., announced Thursday that the combination of Nashville and the Big Machine Music City Grand Prix will help elevate the IndyCar Series even higher globally.

“Next year’s race in Nashville will be an unbridled celebration of the most fierce and competitive motorsport on the planet, set against the backdrop of an innovative and breathtaking stage that includes one of the premier global entertainment districts in the

world,” Miles said.

The change takes effect in 2024 with the Big Machine Grand Prix capping the series schedule Sept. 15. IndyCar’s Victory Lap Celebration will be held Sept. 16 at the Schermerhorn Symphony Center.

The Big Machine Music City Grand Prix concludes its original three-year contract with Sunday’s race. This event uses the NFL’s Tennessee Titans’ Nissan Stadium as a paddock and base with grandstands leading to the 2.17-mile course highlighted by speeding over the Korean Veterans War Memorial Bridge.

The Titans plan to break ground by spring 2024 in that parking lot for a new stadium the NFL team hopes to open for the 2027 season. That meant the course for this event was going to have to be relocated along with the fan zone just outside the stadium.

The course will remain 2.17 miles long with seven turns and still include the bridge where drivers reach speeds of 180 mph before hitting the brakes.

The course also will feature the Country Music Hall of Fame with IndyCars speeding into Nashville’s historic entertainment district and past honky tonks owned by Garth Brooks, Dierks Bentley, Luke Bryan, Alan Jackson and Miranda Lambert along with the Country Music Hall of Fame.

The three-day event also is part music festival. Carly Pearce is singing the national anthem before Sunday’s race.

IndyCar’s final race this season is at Monterey, and Miles said that location will remain on the 2024 series schedule that has yet to be released.

“WeatherTech Raceway Laguna Seca remains a beloved, historic venue

Jacobs was handed the ball 340 times, rushing for 1,653 yards and 12 touchdowns. He also caught 53 passes for 400 yards.

Is there room for White to get more opportunities to make an impact and rest the star back? How White performs in camp will go a long way toward answering that question.

McDaniels said the ability of White, who is 6-foot and 215 pounds, to fight through tackles is especially noticeable.

“I’ve always been impressed with runners that do that,” McDaniels said. “Been around a number of guys that when they hit you, there’s going to be a plus-2 (yards) added on to the run. Zamir, that’s how he ran in college. That’s how we’ve seen him run mostly in practice. He didn’t have a lot of opportunity last year, obviously because of Josh, so just looking forward to continuing to work with him.”

“He’s putting in a lot of time and effort into trying to be a complete player, not just a guy that has the ball and can do something with it. He wants to be good in blitz pickup, he wants to improve in the passing game. All those things are part of a young back’s progression, and he’s really working at all those phases.”

Ameer Abdullah, a ninth-year pro in second season in Las Vegas, is backing up White. Like White, his chances last season were minimal, rushing four times for 20 yards and catching 25 passes for 211 yards.

“It’s really about the moments, seizing the opportunity and just making sure that you’re representing yourself the best way no matter if it’s a kickoff return,

third down, running the ball,” Abdullah said. “For me, it’s about making sure people remember me on that play.”

Behind White and Abdullah are second-year backs Brittain Brown and Sincere McCormick.

This is the time for all those players to show what they have because when and if Jacobs returns, the situation will change drastically.

Jacobs is not paying a financial penalty for missing camp, but he would sacrifice more than half a million dollars a game if he doesn’t report in time for the season. That seems unlikely.

What is more probable is Jacobs signs the franchise tag tender and the \$10.1 million that comes with it or negotiates a one-year deal similar to what Saquon Barkley did with the New York Giants. Barkley agreed to an incentive-laden one-year, \$11 million deal on July 26.

McDaniels said he didn’t have an update on talks with Jacobs.

“Obviously, the backs are all going to get opportunities in training camp,” McDaniels said. “They did last year, and they will always do that because this is our opportunity to try to get them all a foundation in our system and see what they can do and see if they can develop and improve. This is a really important time of the year for everybody in that regard.”

He was probably right to be in denial. Part of a Final Four team his freshman year at Lincoln, Beaman and a very talented Cards team had dreams that went unrealized when his final season there was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Still, a top-500 recruit nationally, Beaman landed at Mizzou, but his time in Columbia has required the equivalent of at least two years of plate discipline. He was redshirted in 2021, then he logged just 11 at-bats and one start in 2022.

By Beaman’s own account, the injury couldn’t have come at a worse time. “My freshman year, I’d be the first to tell you I wasn’t ready,” he said. “Sophomore year, I didn’t really get much opportunity. But I was close to being ready.”

After initially struggling with the internal turmoil that came with being sidelined, Beaman had surgery, then began rehab to build back up strength, ultimately earning him a clean bill of health. Unfortunately, although his own timeline put him to return sometime near the start of the Tigers’ season this past spring, Beaman says the training staff advised Mizzou’s coaches not to push his return, amounting to another year gone by the wayside. It was

tough to watch, as Beaman had to observe other outfielders suffer injury and the team’s depth at the position depleted as he was a passenger. After the year, Mizzou fired baseball head coach Steve Bieser following a 30-24 (10-20 SEC) year that was hampered by injuries like that to the outfielders.

“I’d be lying if I said it hasn’t added fuel to the fire,” Beaman said. “I’m about to be in my fourth year of college at Missouri and no one’s gotten to see what I can do.”

After the year, Mizzou fired baseball head coach Steve Bieser following a 30-24 (10-20 SEC) year that was hampered by injuries like that to the outfielders. But carving out a new beginning while the Tigers worked to hire a new staff, Beaman headed back to Bismarck this summer, and the results couldn’t be more promising.

In 42 games, Beaman hit .292 (154 ABs) to go along with 10 HRs and 37 RBIs, both team-highs for the Larks. He came out of the gates flying, smashing the ball out of the park. And his work out of a midseason funk may have shown that he’s matured mentally through some of the suffering, too.

With such extensive travel — eight-hour trips to games aren’t unusual — Beaman spoke of the inability to just solve a slump by hitting off a machine as he could in Lincoln or at Mizzou. But he found motivation from

another playmaker familiar to millions and began to bash the ball yet again.

“When I really went on that tear [at the end of this summer], it sounds crazy, but [it happened after] I watched the Netflix ‘Quarterback’ documentary on Patrick Mahomes,” said Beaman, a big Chiefs fan. “He gets in Maxx Crosby’s face, and he’s like, ‘You woke up the wrong MFer, you better hope I don’t get hot-type thing.’ And I just took that into my next game. It was that type of energy.”

“I threw everything else out the window. They’ve got to get me out. It just changed everything to be honest.”

He proceeded to bat .438 in his last 10 games of the summer, including a stretch of four HRs in three games. Dealing with a minor knee injury and coming off an ACL tear, Beaman called it a summer on July 19 despite earning a selection to the All-Star Game and the league’s Great Plains All-Star Home Run Challenge, both of which took place earlier this week.

“The last thing you want to do [coming off that injury] is push it too far, so I wanted to reach a certain amount of games, then ease out to give myself a break,” Beaman said. “But I started playing really well again, so that was good to leave on a high note. I was joking with one of my coaches that you can never pick your hot streaks. You never know when the next

one’s gonna come.”

The hope for Beaman is that, after much waiting, next spring will be one big hot streak. Playing time looks like it’ll finally be for the taking under new Mizzou head coach Kerrick Johnson, a former assistant in Columbia — and at Jefferson College way back — who most recently led University of Memphis to a winning season.

“I’ve talked [to the new staff] at least three times on the phone, and I’m going to meet them this week hopefully in person,” said Beaman, who knows he still has more to clean up mechanically, but continues to improve as he sees tougher pitching. “They said, ‘We see you’re tearing it up and we’re excited to get you back, get this thing going and get the program turned around.’ A coach that’s never seen you play in person isn’t gonna say you’re gonna start and bat in the 3-hole, but he seems excited and ready to get it turned around. That fires me up, because I’m a home-state kid. I’m ready to get rolling.”

He’ll roll as a changed man, but for the better after an injury that’s seemed to free him mentally.

“I’ve known in my heart forever how good I can be, but it was about finally digging and tapping into that,” Beaman said. “I’m finally at the point in my career where it’s like, instead of proving people wrong, I’m going to prove myself right.”

Bullard has moved on. “We’re going into another season,” he said. “That play’s over, man. To be honest, I don’t really have too much to say about that. It’s over and done with. We’re looking on and preparing ourselves for camp.”

Georgia’s offseason was rocked by a high-speed crash that killed offensive lineman Devin Willock and a member of the football staff just hours after the Bulldogs celebrated their second straight championship with a parade through Athens.

The wreck led to racing and reckless driving charges against departing Georgia star Jalen Carter and revelations of multiple cases of excessive speeding and reckless driving involving other players.

Smart insisted he had not lost control of the program but ac-

knowledged that he’s struggled to persuade his players to slow down behind the wheel — even after the death of one of their own.

Star linebacker Jamon Dumas-Johnson was among those arrested for a racing incident that occurred before the fatal crash but came to light afterward.

Dumas-Johnson said he’s been disciplined by Smart, without going into details, and said he hopes to set an example for his teammates.

“I’m definitely disappointed in myself, the decision I made,” Dumas-Johnson said. “I made a bad decision, but I take full responsibility for what I did.”

He doesn’t think the program should be defined by its off-the-field troubles.

“I definitely don’t think it’s the culture that we’re creating,” Dumas-Johnson said. “Just some bad choices that we’re making right now. Hopefully the team will get it together.”

The biggest on-field issue facing

the team heading into its quest for a three-peat is at quarterback, where the Bulldogs must settle on a replacement for the guy who played such a huge role in their two national championships, Stetson Bennett.

Carson Beck, who was Bennett’s top backup, appeared to have the upper hand coming out of spring practice, but Smart has not yet settled on a starter. Brock Vandagriff took snaps with the first team throughout the spring, and Gunner Stockton is also in the mix.

“For those quarterbacks, it’s not to overwhelm themselves with results, to overwhelm themselves with the process of getting better,” Smart said. “Each one of them has individual things they need to work on, but for the whole I want to see them manage the offense, understand the offense, get people lined up and execute.”

“The guy that does that best in critical situations will be the guy that becomes the quarterback.”

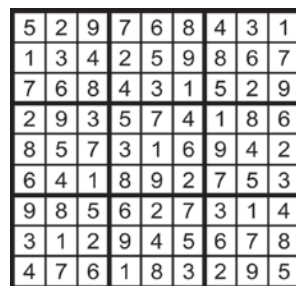
