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CAROLINA AMADOR: FROM NOVICE TO CHANPION IN A DAY

The tension in the air as the results to see who made it to the finals round at the District 32-4A Lincoln Douglas debate meet made this moment all the more nerve-wracking. She had memorized her cases by heart, evidence after evidence, arguing to the best of her ability for the past four rounds, affirming or negating the claim. Then, the meet director made his way to the middle of the room with the results of the semi-final matches. Her name was shockingly announced, which meant she made it to the UIL 4A regionals competition.



Junior Carolina Amador

competed on March 28 at the 32-4A Lincoln Douglas Debate meet and placed second among other schools, including McAllen Achieve ECHS.

"I was just so grateful to have even made it to the finals round," Amador said.

Amador had been interested in debate since freshman year, and even though she joined sophomore year, she didn't have the chance to compete until this year.

"I've always wanted to join because it seems so fun," Amador says. "I was excited to try LD Debate as I could see that the debaters were getting amped up when it was their turn to rebuttal." Amador didn't know she would compete until shortly before the district meet. She decided to take on the challenge to debate as she saw no harm would come from the opportunity. However, she was going in as prepared as possible.

"I went home and just started gathering all my materials and going over the topic," Amador says. "I made sure to cover material on both my affirmative and negative cases, and I also made sure to memorize all the formattings."

After hours of debating, Amador ended up placing second in the meet, making it to the final round of debate, which means she advanced to the Regionals competition.

"I just plan on preparing my cases [for regionals] some more as I received a lot of amazing feedback from various judges during the competition," Amador shares her goals. "Because I don't have much experience, I'm hoping to make it past two rounds at least, as it will help me better prepare for next year as I'll know what to expect."

EVANNY TREVINO OF JIMMY CARTER ECHS WINS FIRST PLACE AT THE TEXAS SCIENCE & ENGINEERING FAIR

Evanny Trevino, a Jimmy Carter Early College High School student, emerged as the first-place winner in the environmental engineering category at the 2023 Texas Science & Engineering Fair (TXSEF) held on March 24-25 at the Texas A&M University Student Recreation Center.

Trevino's innovative submission, titled "Plastic Waste: A Sustainable Aggregate for Concrete," explored the potential of utilizing plastic waste as a sustainable alternative to traditional aggregates in concrete production. The project aimed to address the growing global issue of plastic waste and its environmental impact while simultaneously offering a solution to reduce the ecological footprint of the construction industry.

The annual TXSEF event, hosted by Texas A&M University's College of Engineering, brought together the brightest young minds from across the state to showcase their innovative projects in various science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) fields. The two-day event featured over 1,200 projects from middle and high school students who had qualified through regional science and engineering fairs.

Trevino's project caught the judges' attention due to its practicality and potential to revolutionize the construction industry while addressing environmental concerns. The research demonstrated that incorporating plastic waste as an aggregate in concrete could improve its durability, reduce the number of natural resources used in production, and help mitigate the plastic pollution crisis.

The project involved testing various combinations of plastic and concrete mixtures to determine the optimal ratio for performance and sustainability. Trevino's findings indicated that replacing a portion of traditional aggregates with plastic waste reduced the overall environmental impact and enhanced the concrete's properties in specific applications.



Trevino's win at the TXSEF highlights the importance of fostering innovative thinking among young scientists and engineers as they continue to develop solutions that address the world's most pressing environmental challenges.

On a recent morning at Tabasco Elementary, students got a special greeting from some spirited guests: the La Joya High School Softball Team.



READING CHALLENGE WINNERS SPRING INTO CREATIVITY




The 5th Six Weeks Reading Challenge winners at Tabasco Elementary got to explore a bit of springtime creativity after earning their golden tickets.

TCHATT OFFERS SERVICES IN A 3-STEP PROCESS

WHAT IS TCHATT?

TCHATT is the Texas Child Health Access Through Telemedicine (TCHATT); it is one of the programs under the Texas Child Mental Health Care Consortium (TCMHCC), a statewide initiative created to address gaps in mental health care for children and adolescents in Texas.

UTRGV offers the TCHATT program to schools in South Texas, and we are pleased to say that it is available in all our schools. The program provides schools with (1) access to mental health telemedicine services for at-risk students and (2) mental health educational opportunities for school personnel and families. TCHATT aims to increase access and reduce wait time for mental health services for children and adolescents in Texas. School staff identifies and refers students to the program for on-campus appointments or at-home appointments available via Zoom.


HARD HATS AND CONSTRUCTION
