Bolivia has 52 species of parrots (Family: Psittacidae). In the National Park Torotoro, there are 8 registered species which include macaw and parakeet parrots. The National Park Torotoro is located in Potosí, which is characterized by terrain with cliffs of 200 m high (canyons) that borders it. This topography and geological formations create unique landscape scenery. Its average temperature is 18°C and has an annual precipitation of 750 mm, presenting a dry, arid climate. All of these conditions are ideal for the presence, feeding, overnight roosting, and nesting of these registered parrots. It is home to the endemic species *Ara rubrogenys*, housing the largest population of this species in its northern distribution.
