State lawmakers debate \$10 million proposal for Martin University

Gov. Eric Holcomb proposed \$10 million for Martin University, Indiana's only predominantly Black college, in the next state budget, and a leader in the Indiana Black Legislative Caucus wants to make sure the school gets the funding.

But the chairman of the state Senate Appropriations Committee would like to see the funds allocated to all the schools in the state.

State Sen. Eddie Melton said figuring out a funding solution is a priority of the Indiana Black Legislative Caucus. "For the \$10 million request from Martin University, I know the window is closing on time to narrow down and negotiate these issues. I'm hopeful that both the caucus of the Senate Democrats and



the House Democrats will be included in conversations moving forward," said Melton.

Martin University President and CEO Dr. Sean Huddleston said he and the governor have been speaking for some time about the importance of the university to the state.

He said Martin could help with workforce development, "particularly in careers that have low levels of diversity but

Mayor Joe Hogsett announces \$9.9 million federal award for housing and homelessness prevention

Indianapolis received \$9.9 million in Continuum of Care (Coc) funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to support community projects serving high-risk residents seeking affordable housing.

Mayor Hogsett announced the federal award with other community partners at Parker Place Senior Apartments. It is one of the largest federal grants to address homelessness received by the city.

"We are proud to announce that the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has



granted 100% of the funds that we requested. That type of commitment allows us to maintain and expand services this year," said Mayor Hogsett.

Funds will go towards over 20 community projects led by Indianapolis housing and service

providers, as well as three new projects that exist to help different communities:

KIPP Indy Legacy High School instills the value of higher education

The first graduating class of KIPP Indy Legacy High School is set to walk across the stage next month.

Since the school's inception, to guarantee student success school leaders have taken the unique approach of ensuring their almost 400 students are in a safe and supported space.

As students prepare to embark on their next journey, Dr. YeVonne Jones, the managing director of postsecondary education for the school, said she is proud of their accomplishments so far.

"Working with this class of seniors we support them regardless of where they're going. Whether it's a four-year, two-year or anything else, they're ready for it. It's been extraordinary to watch how they've been able to navigate this year in particular," said Jones.

The students lost two of their peers to gun violence during the pandemic. Their school also lost a member of its staff earlier this year.

David Spencer, the school's leader, said he saw this graduating class work together and encourage one another to succeed despite facing numerous hardships.

He said that he has watched these students mature and grow since they were in middle school and that this group of seniors wants to be successful.

"To watch them identify who they want to be and how they want to impact the world, the world gets to see what we've seen inside these walls in the last four years," said Spender.

School leaders plan to stay in contact with alumni after they graduate to act as a support system.

"If not every day, it's every other day that we hold seminars based on class schedules to discuss their college application process, job readiness, resumes, LinkedIn accounts, even preparing them for other things like getting a

license or IDs to apply to jobs," said Jones.

Their goal is to ensure that each student obtains the best academic, social and emotional fit after graduating.

In his recent State of Higher Education Address, Chris Lowery, the Indiana commissioner for higher education, outlined the HOPE (Hoosier Opportunities and Possibilities Through Education) agenda. He discussed the challenges facing higher education, including declining enrollment, completion and graduation retention rates.

In fact, only 53% of Indiana high school graduates from the class of 2020 pursued higher education, a 12% decline over the last five years.

Despite these challenges, Indiana set a goal over a decade ago to have at least 60% of Hoosiers with a quality credential beyond high school by 2025.

While the pandemic may have slowed progress, educators and policymakers are working to ensure that more students have access to higher education and the opportunities it provides.

KIPP Indy Legacy High School leaders said that their students are proof that with hard work and determination, anything is possible.

"We're going to be checking in on them every semester. Students will be doing what's called FERPA waivers so we can get transcript access," said Jones. "We're going to be sending care packages to those entering the work force. Even gifts and gas cards to let them know we're thinking of them."

They have 83 students who are on track for graduation on May 18.

FREETOWN VILLAGE HIGHLIGHTS VIBRANCY OF INDIANA AVENUE

Highlighting the former glory of Indiana Avenue's jazz scene, Freetown Village will present "A Musical Journey of Indiana Avenue" as part of its annual Musical Journey series.

The program, which takes place April 29 at Witherspoon Presbyterian Church, will focus on the historical significance of the Avenue, the music and businesses that once resided there, and the community it fostered. Ophelia Wellington, founding director of Freetown Village, said the living museum aims to educate the community about African American history through theater performances, storytelling, music and educational workshops and programming.

Wellington said the "Musical Journey" series was started four years ago to place an emphasis on how music is part

of Black culture and heritage. Although they were not able to practice and perform live together during the pandemic, Wellington said the Indiana Avenue theme has been in the works for a while.

"You know, a lot of people think of jazz and New Orleans, but Indiana was also out here with jazz," Wellington said. "Up and down Indiana Avenue in its heyday, there were a lot of jazz clubs, so people could go from one club to the other up and down Indiana Avenue, listening to music and having a good time."

Bill Myers, Indy-based jazz musician, actor and educator, said jazz singer and Freetown Village member Sandy Lomax asked him to help with the project due to his experience with and knowledge of the musicians who once made Indiana Avenue a cultural hub. Although Myers himself never played in any of the former

clubs of Indiana Avenue, he said his music career took off early thanks to older jazz musicians such as Buddy Montgomery, Melvin Rhyne, Slide Hampton and the Hampton sisters, Jimmy Coe, Alonzo "Pookie" Johnson and many others who took him under their wings.

"You never forget where you come from," Myers said. "Wherever I went, I took those guys with me because they taught me about performing ... They challenged me - I mean, they literally threw me in the water and either I would sink, or I would swim - thank God I swam."

Indiana Avenue was essentially the "Harlem of Indiana," and Myers said this project is so important because Indianapolis' famed historic venues no longer exist – except for the Madam Walker Legacy Center and Crispus Attucks High School. Telling the

stories of Indiana Avenue is imperative, as Myers said the stories are all they have left, and it can prevent "revisionist history" from replacing the history of Indiana Avenue with a new story.

"A Musical Journey of Indiana Avenue" will feature the Freetown Village singers performing gospels and spirituals, as Myers said faith has always been integral to the Black community and jazz. The program will also include musical performances from Sandy Lomax, a jazz trio and Myers himself as well as video clips, featured interviews and anecdotes with renowned Indiana Avenue musicians and residents.

"I think it's important that we're able to continue to honor the legacy that they left behind, McGowan at 317-762-7848. which doesn't even resonate solely in Indianapolis," Myers said. "When you say 'Indiana Avenue' in New York, Kansas

City, Cincinnati, Europe... they know what you're talking about, and it's this same community of musicians that has such a tremendous impact worldwide."

Myers said he hopes that audiences will leave with a deeper understanding of how the musicians from the Indiana Avenue scene were "revered globally for their contribution to jazz and their greater contribution to the black culture of Indianapolis."

Freetown Village's "A Musical Journey of Indiana Avenue" takes place April 29 at 6 p.m. at Witherspoon Presbyterian Church, 5136 Michigan Road. Tickets are \$25 and can be purchased at freetown.org.

poetry was not regarded the way it is today, Massey said she went to open mic nights and events hosted by Januarie York and Tony Styxx to listen to other poets and build the confidence to read her work.

"I was sharing poems in college, but I wasn't, like, doing slam, or I wasn't thinking about doing it professionally," she said. "I wanted to share them, and I wanted to be in space with people who wrote them .. From there, I decided to keep writing. I would show up with all of my notebooks and read all of whatever poems filled out the page." Since 2018, her essays and poetry have been published by publications such as the Indianapolis Review, Solstice Magazine, Indiana Humanities and VKR Press. Massey is also back in school and is passionate about educating the youth about creative writing and finding healthy outlets to express themselves. Now, Massey said her work is inspired by sources such as history, Afro-futuristic ideals, time travel and things she has survived and reflect what she feels needs to be said. She is always reading and studying poetry and said she often goes back to her older poems to find ways to make them clearer or better. As the arts scene in Indianapolis continues to thrive, Massey said it is important that opportunities for poets, especially those of color, be included in arts, writing and humanities. As an art form, Massey said poetry can sustain communities and inspire those who are navigating difficult things. "The art form itself — of writing — is being more inclusive about poetry being an important art form ...

that informs and liberates and improves the quality of our lives," she said. "Which I think is important; we need art to just help us be more expressive."

Indianapolis-based poet and author Chantel Massey is helping the local poetry scene grow and thrive.

Massey, who wrote and published "Bursting At The Seams" in 2018, has been writing from the early age of 8 years old — inspired by the works of Maya Angelou as she scribbled poems into notebooks as an outlet for her feelings. "What I love most about being a poet, I would say, is the opportunity to facilitate conversations that are difficult to have — with poetry being such a creative way of using language," Massey said. "I think it gives people like, I don't want to say a shield but maybe like a superpower, something where people feel more empowered to really explore what it is that they themselves need to say.' When she first started writing poems, Massey said she drew inspiration from her friends and family – often the stories her aunts and uncles told her growing up — with a style called "confessional poetry." But it wasn't until she went off to college in Wooster, Ohio that Massey really immersed herself into a poetry community. Her campus at Wooster did not have a poetry club, so Massey said she decided to start one — which hosted open mic nights each Friday in the apartment she shared with 10 other girls.

After college, Massey returned to Indianapolis to get involved with the local poetry scene. Although

The State of Black America 2023 report

The State of Black America annual report released by the National Urban League reveals bleak findings. According to this year's Equality Index, Black Americans only receive 73.9% of the same benefits and opportunities as their white counterparts.

The report focuses on hate crimes, white supremacist ideology, the attack on Black history within education and other political legislation that affects African Americans.

Despite some advancement in economic and health sectors, the gap between African American and white students has widened in education, social justice and civic participation since the inception of the index in 2005.

"The mainstreaming of extremist ideology is an existential threat to American democracy, the rule of law and decades of hard-won progress toward an equitable, inclusive, more perfect union," National Urban League President and CEO Marc H. Morial said.

The president said hate is no longer limited to passing out mimeographed leaflets on street corners or huddling in corners of the dark web. Conspiracy-mongers and

white nationalists openly spew their bile across social media and cable television.

They weave it into the public policy that they impose on their constituents. It corrodes the trust between police and the military and the communities they are sworn to protect and serve.

Using data from the Southern Poverty Law Center, Anti-Defamation League and UCLA Law, this year's State of Black America reveals how deeply extremist ideology has seeped into America's most vital institutions.

This results in an ever-rising tide of deadly violence, oppressive laws and weaponized racial polarization.

"Unfortunately, the rise in hate crimes is occurring in the midst of a general atmosphere where Black Americans are regularly being portrayed in the media as the face of crime in America," said Russell.

He said the recent nearly fatal shooting of Kansas City teen Ralph Yarl is the perfect example. Yarl was shot twice for ringing the wrong doorbell and being told he did not belong there. He was shot while attempting to responsibly pick up his younger siblings.

The teen aspires to become a chemical engineer and to join a marching band. Russell said even our best and brightest students are not exempt from the programmed hatred and its vicious consequences for America.

After surviving two close range gunshots, including one shot to his face, Yarl tried knocking on other doors in the neighborhood seeking help. An ambulance was finally called by the third house he implored, but only after he was instructed to raise his hands in the air.

"Does anyone truly believe this would happen to a white teenager under the same circumstances?" said Russell.

Russell agrees with the report regarding national wide attempts to erase the contributions of African Americans through state legislation under the guise of parental rights.

"This approach was tried in the Indiana legislature last year in bills to oppose the so-called teaching of Critical Race Theory which was not taught in high school. Fortunately, the Indianapolis Urban League and its many allies were able to defeat the legislation," said Russell.



24-year-old and under partners 30 units for chronically homeless Horizon House clients

Horizon House, which sits five minutes away from where the mayor made his announcement, was busy as usual with the daily intake of people that come through their doors.

The shelter has been around for more than 30 years and offers laundry, showers, nutritious meals to go, hygiene items, medical assistance through Eskenazi, case managers to assist with housing and jobs, access to telephones, clothing and shoes from donations and access to mail. 200 neighbors a day.

Last year they were shy of 7,000 new neighbors and had over 38,000 visits total.

Their outreach team goes out into the encampments to bring them supplies and talk to neighbors about coming to Horizon House. The goal is to help them transition into housing.

Because of the lack of affordable and low barrier housing, Horizon House has started to break ground on a new

The director of development and communications, Judy Neumen said they are one of the few shelters that offer mail delivery.

She said they do not use terms like homeless often.

Instead, they call them neighbors.

"That's who they are. They're our neighbors in the community. Homelessness is not a class of people. It's a temporary condition. We treat them with hospitality, dignity and respect. Our neighbors are people too. They're just like you and I. They just don't have a home," said Nueman.

Although they take men, women and children, men make up 70% of their regular neighbors in attendance, while women make up 30%. They see 20% of families in attendance together.

Nueman said they get between 150 to

facility being built next door.

Called The Compass on Washington, it will serve as a 36-unit one-bedroom apartment building for their neighbors. It is currently under construction.

"This started in November of last year and it's going to be done about May of next year. That's part of the mayor's initiative that he wants to provide more low barrier housing. I know 36 may not sound like a lot, but it gets 36 people off the streets," said Nueman.

Although Tribble asked for Brown's removal, Dr. Patricia Payne and Stephen Lane stood with him, preventing security from intervening.

"You do not get to have nine months of public comment, you do not get to have two separate executive searches," Brown said. "This is incredibly disrespectful to me and to everybody else in this room ... every single comment supported Nichelle Hayes for CEO."

Once behind closed doors, Tribble, White, Raymond Biederman and Palacios voted in support of Hill while community members gathered outside the room, banging against the walls so hard the paintings had to be taken down and chanting, "appoint Hayes now" and "Tribble's got to go."

Lane, the only board member who voted against the resolution, voiced his concern for Hill's selection. He said it was too soon to vote on this, given it was Palacios' first meeting, and he is still "getting his footing."

"I think this resolution further erodes the trust of this board and erodes the legitimacy of this board," Lane said. "I think it's a sham, and I think it's very disrespectful to the community and the library workers."

Payne and Dr. Khaula Murtadha were not in attendance for the vote but voiced opposition to the resolution before leaving the meeting.

Hill, who became CEO effective immediately, was appointed acting CEO of the library in December 2022 following the failed nationwide CEO search that resulted in Dr. Gabriel Morley being offered the position over former interim CEO and founding Director of the Center for Black Literature and Culture Nichelle M. Hayes.

Morley declined the job, but the board still refused to offer Hayes the position, citing concerns for her "interpersonal relations with others."

Haves garnered community support as a Black woman who has "come up the ranks" of the library and has strong personal ties to the community and a dedication to employees and DEI work.

Hill has worked with the library since 2011 in various roles, including a clerk at the Warren Branch, adult reference librarian at Central Library, manager at the Decatur Branch and most recently, as acting CEO and chief public services officer. Although he did not apply to the CEO position during the search, Tribble said she was confident his leadership was the right choice for the library. He is the first Black CEO to hold the position permanently.

"We are a long way from where we were in December," Tribble said. "We had concerns about making sure there was an executive presence to help run the library, and, in that time, Gregory Hill emerged as a leader."

Over the last six months, the board — which has seen two resignations and three new members since December — refused to offer Hayes the position, even after endless cries from the community and a letter from the City-County Council requesting they do so.

As new members Lane and White took seats on the board, flickers of hope rose from the community that Hayes might be appointed. However, in a shocking revelation during the March meeting, White - who initially supported Hayes - announced he had changed his mind after "learning the facts." In an email he sent to Hayes March 21, which was published by the Indianapolis Star, White explained how the board never intended to offer Hayes the position and gave his reasoning behind supporting Hill for the position instead. "They played the game of keeping you in the process because they just knew the lady from California or the guy from Atlanta [Dr. Gabriel Morley] would beat you out," White wrote. "They never thought that you would be the last candidate standing, and when you were, they didn't have the courage to tell the community why they didn't give vou the job."

"Hopefully, going in the direction that we're going that there will be healing again and not much discomfort. I've been in this role since December," he said. "I think that since I've been in this role, we've made progress, so I think progress will continue."

Hill also confirmed HIV testing had resumed at IndyPL locations April 6 thanks to a new partnership with Step up and Shalom Health Care Center.

longer, but there may be plans to hire someone new in that position down the road.

"I choose to do this for several reasons," Hill said. "One of them is contribution, service, kindness, trustworthiness and meaningful work. I thought about all those different personal core values as this was going on, and that's why I choose to lead."

According to Hill, Hayes is still employed with the library as the manager of the CBLC.

"I worked with her when she was the interim and I was the chief Public Services Officer," Hill told the Recorder. "I have a very good working relationship with her, and I would expect that to continue."

Lane said the resolution to appoint Hill was "sprung on them" during an executive session April 21, and members of the board had only been given 10 minutes to interview Hill before voting to offer him the position Monday night.

"I was put on this board to build bridges, but you can't build bridges when there's a wall put up," Lane told the Recorder. "There's all this stuff we're being blindsided with and left out of; we CPayne and Murtadha] don't know what's going on as board members."

Going forward

Although Tribble said the night did not go how she expected it to, Hill's appointment was "absolutely a good thing" that she believes will help the library move forward. Moving forward, Tribble said her expectations for the library are focused on healing.

"We have to reconcile, and we have to heal," she said. "We have to do that as a board, we have to do that in and with the community, and then we have to give some space for the good work that's about to happen."

However, Lane told the Recorder the events of the night have placed "a huge stain on the institution," but he will continue to fight for the public library as a cornerstone of democracy.

In a separate interview with the Recorder, Hill said although he didn't expect the meeting to play out the way it did, he did anticipate it to be "a little contentious."

However, his plans for the library are to continue building connections with the community and healing the rift, accommodating patrons and launching new programing.

We need to talk about money

The Greatness and Grace of Harry Belafonte

This week the world lost one of its truly great freedom fighters in the person of Harry Belafonte. For roughly seven decades, Mr. Belafonte fought for human dignity with his fame, his influence – and his checkbook. As

the Civil Rights Movement collapsed into cardiac arrest, Belafonte was at its bedside with a defibrillator, trying to shock it back to life. Of course, activism isn't what initially made him a household name.

Just as Dick Gregory made audiences laugh years before he made them think, Belafonte made audiences move their legs rhythmically before he made them move their bodies politically. He was born in New York, lived primarily in New York, and ultimately died in New York. But, ultimately, Belafonte was a native of Jamaica (the island, not the neighborhood in Queens). He was a true son of the West Indies. That sensibility was evident in everything from Belafonte's crooning to his crusading.

In the 1950s, Belafonte became known as the "King of Calypso," referencing the enchanting music of the Caribbean. "Day-O (The Banana Boat Song)" was his signature hit. Sung in the traditional call-and-response tradition of Black music, Day-O was featured on Belafonte's second album. That album, Calypso, became the first LP by a solo artist to sell one million copies. At that point, Belafonte became the biggest musical artist in the world – of any race.

Belafonte had a silky-smooth delivery. And it didn't hurt that he had movie idol good looks. As Belafonte intoned, "Daylight come and me want to go home," millions of women wanted to know that address. Yet, as Belafonte explained, "Day-O" was actually a protest song. The lyrics conveyed the story that the "banana boat men," who endured tough physical labor all night, were arguing that "the tally man" should pay them a fair wage for their work.

While we should never forget his

substantial musical legacy, Belafonte will be remembered most for generally shunning the entertainment world in favor of serving those whom Jesus called "the least of these." He was a masterful singer who used his substantial platform to amplify the voices of the marginalized. (He was already a veteran activist by the time he joined Bob Geldof's collection of voices for "We Are the World".)

Crucially, Belafonte was no shill for a political party and was never shy about holding those who were more powerful and wealthy than he was accountable. Those whom he publicly chastised include President Obama, Jay-Z and Beyoncé, all of whom he accused of failing to do more on behalf of African Americans, especially those who are impoverished. For Belafonte, the principle of representing those who lacked power was über alles.

We don't have royalty in the United States, at least not officially. If we did, the list of surnames would include Kennedy, Bush and Belafonte. Unlike the House of Windsor, Belafonte didn't need a crown – or even a political office – to be regal. Further, he had metropolitan sensibilities and a cosmopolitan appeal, but, to borrow from Kipling, he never lost "the common touch." Still, time is undefeated. Eventually, the lightness in his voice gave way to a gravelly gravitas (though he maintained his boyish visage into his seventies).

Four years shy of turning 100, we are told that Belafonte's heart finally gave out. The news shouldn't have come as a surprise; he spent his life giving his heart to others. We should be eternally grateful for his sojourn among us. In Greek mythology, Calypso detained Odysseus for several years before Zeus ordered her to let release him.

Not very long ago, daylight came and God allowed Harry Belafonte to go home.



are in high demand."

"Secondly, because most of Martin University's graduates stay in Indiana and Indianapolis, (the governor) wanted to know how he could best contribute to an institution that wasn't contributing to brain drain," said Huddleston.

The brain drain is when Hoosiers leave the state to pursue higher education and or career paths elsewhere.

Aside from workforce needs, Martin could also help other colleges and institutions retain and graduate their low-income and first-generation students, he said.

The \$10 million would essentially be used for three primary areas of workforce that there is high demand for:

Teachers

Law enforcement professionals STEM professions

"So, the thought was if the state could help Martin build capacity to be able to provide more educational opportunities and resources for students pursuing those career areas, then we might be able to help the entire state in those spaces," Huddleston said.

House Bill 1001 appropriates funding for K-12 and higher education, and the budget proposal includes the \$10 million for Martin. The snag came after the budget proposal was sent to the State Senate Appropriations Committee.

"For some reason, the Senate did not feel that the funding should be retained. I think they unfortunately mischaracterized the funds as per student funding," said Huddleston.

Sen. Ryan Mishler, a Republican and chair of the Appropriations Committee, said at the time that the \$10 million would roughly amount to \$40,000 of Martin's estimated 250 students.

He felt the funding proposal could have a greater impact for more students if they allowed any school in the state to be included in the funding. The committee suggested making the \$10 million accessible to all Indiana colleges and universities that would want to serve low-income and minority students.

"So, when they did the calculations with the number of students, they felt that would not be a good use of funds on a per student basis, but the funding was never intended to be per student aid," said Huddleston, Martin's CEO.

He said the money was meant to help the university build capacity,

technology, learning spaces, build out their structural capabilities, create stronger partnerships with corporations for apprenticeship opportunities for their students and create smaller retention grants to reward students for continuing their education.

"Either they didn't understand or didn't know that that was the intent. In doing their calculations for \$45,000, they thought that that was unfair so instead they created a different way to use the funds," said Huddleston.

He said the challenge with that approach is that if the \$10 million were stretched across the state, that wouldn't even be able to cover the cost for one textbook for a student, thus reducing the impact it would have for students.

"So, we're hopeful that the House and the Senate, when they reach an agreement on the final budget, will have the funding restored for Martin University," said Huddleston.

He has met with Mishler to discuss the issue, and the university has drawn support from the Indiana Black Legislative Caucus.

State lawmakers are in Conference Committee throughout the week, with the timeline for passing a final budget by the end of the month. We will update this story with more details as they come.



New net-zero housing on far east side wins award from U.S. Department of Energy

Students and faculty at Ball State University are making positive impacts on both the planet and people's lives through net-zero energy, ecofriendly duplexes that will eventually be home for two families, and they're winning awards while they're at it. The home will produce at least as much energy as it consumes.

Students at BSU's R. Wayne Estopinal College of Architecture and Planning (CAP) designed the 201 N. Temple Ave duplex with faculty leads, consultants and design advisors for a competition that challenges student teams to design net-zero energy homes using 'green" building techniques. The U.S. Department of Energy challenge is combined with a high-impact learning experience for students, allowing them to earn credit for working with community partners

lenges. The students at CAP were named the Grand Prize Winners of the Build Challenge, beating out 15 other teams from around the world, for their work on the duplex. The duplex, dubbed the Alley House, is part of Englewood CDC's plan to redevelop 20 vacant lots in the Englewood neighborhood. Over the last 21 years, BSU students and faculty have engaged in more than 3,300 learning projects focused on solving community challenges, like the Alley House.

"If we are going to be successful as planners, architects, engineers, financiers, and community developers, we must make it possible for under-resourced populations to access zero-energy, highperformance, quality-built residences," said Professor of Architecture Pamela Harwood in a news release.

Immunizations Protect Children from Disease

National Infant Immunization Week (NIIW), April 24-30, is an annual observance to highlight the importance of protecting infants from vaccine-preventable diseases and to celebrate the achievements of immunization programs and their partners in promoting healthy communities. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recommend that children stay on track with their wellchild appointments and routine vaccinations. The COVID-19 pandemic caused many disruptions in families' lives. In some cases, it meant children have missed or had a delay in wellness checkups and vaccination, which are a critical part of ensuring children stay healthy. A CDC report released in May 2020 found a troubling decrease in routine childhood vaccinations because of families staying at home. While families followed public health warnings about going out, an unfortunate result was many missed recommended vaccinations. On-time vaccination is critical to provide protection against potentially life-threatening diseases. Giving babies the recommended vaccinations by age two is the best way to protect them from I4 serious childhood diseases, such as whooping cough and measles. Parents are encouraged to talk to their child's doctor to ensure that their baby is up to date on vaccinations. Vaccines are among the most successful and cost-effective public health tools available for preventing disease and death. The Marion County Public Health Department offers vaccines for children by appointment and at a reduced cost through its district health offices and the ACTION Health Center. ONE YEAR AFTER HERMAN WHITFIELD'S DEATH; one step closer to a fully funded mental health crisis response team

It has been a year since Gladys and Herman Whitfield Jr. called the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department because their son was having an apparent mental health episode. But it was a call that ended in tragedy.

Herman "Tres" Whitfield III died in police custody.

Following Whitfield's death on April 25, 2022, spiritual leaders from Faith in Indiana called for action to ensure that such a tragedy would not reoccur, and some progress has been made.

Faith in Indiana and city officials have emphasized the need for a 24hour and fully funded mental health crisis response team, and Indianapolis now has a Mobile Crisis Assistance Team, or MCAT.

But the team only operates 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Details of a pilot program were teased last September. While the details of the new program are not public, city officials and faith leaders have been working behind the scenes to finalize a contract with the organization establishing it, said Josh Riddick of Faith in Indiana, who added that an announcement is coming soon.

"While I wish we were up and running, the progress made has been really good," Riddick said.

The 39-year-old Whitfield was an accomplished musician and groundbreaking composer, often captivating audiences with hymns he had heard by ear. An Indianapolis Star article

referred to Whitfield as "a virtuoso on the rise" when he was 14 years old. And Whitfield won the Detroit Symphony Orchestra's "emerging African-American composers" competition twice.

Days after Whitfield's death, calls for a new 24-hour crisis response team began and faith leaders called for the firing of the officers who arrived on scene.

The Marion County Coroner's Office ruled Whitfield's in-custody death as a homicide last June.

According to the report, Whitfield died of "cardiopulmonary arrest in the setting of law enforcement subdual, prone restraint and conducted electrical weapon use," the report lists "morbid obesity" and "hypertensive cardiovascular disease" as contributing factors.

The Whitfield family filed a wrongful death lawsuit against the city and the officers on June 22, 2022. A week later, IMPD released the 911 call and bits of body camera footage from the incident. The family maintains that the video IMPD released was "selective and biased" and created a "false narrative" of what happened, and they fought for the release of the full body camera footage through court. After a delay in releasing the footage, a federal judge ordered IMPD on Jan. 3, 2023 to release the complete body footage as a part of the ongoing lawsuit. Gladys Whitfield had asked officers if they were going to kill her son, a revelation that didn't come to light until the release of body camera footage. She was assured by Officer Dominique Clark that the officers were "just talking to him."

Whitfield's death brought Black faith leaders together to rally at the Statehouse in February to call for a fully funded mental health crisis response system across the state. That bill would provide all Hoosiers with a mental health helpline. The General Assembly has not taken final action on the measure.

An Indiana Behavioral Health Commission report determined that untreated mental illness costs Indiana \$4.2 billion yearly. Establishing and running a crisis response system will cost \$130.6 million annually, the same report found.

Èarlier this month, a Marion County grand jury indicted two officers for their alleged roles in Whitfield's death. Steven Sanchez, who allegedly deployed the stun gun, and Adam Ahmad were charged with involuntary manslaughter, reckless homicide, battery resulting in serious bodily injury, battery resulting in moderate injury and battery. Yet, all six officers involved in the incident remain on paid administrative duty status, according to IMPD. It is unclear whether other officers who were on scene will be charged.

Pope to visit Hungary amid diverging views on war, migrants



Kenyan cult deaths at 73, president likens them to terrorism

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — The spiritual priorities of Pope Francis will be on display during a trip this week to Hungary, where the populist government will seek to downplay its diverging views on matters like immigration and minority rights while focusing instead on points where it aligns with the pontiff.

Francis will meet with children with disabilities, refugees and those living in poverty on the three-day trip that begins Friday. He will also have an audience with Hungary's president and its nationalist prime minister, Viktor Orbán.

The visit will be a political boon for Orbán, whose contentious stances on migration, Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine and LG-BTQ+ rights stand in stark contrast with Francis' views of inclusion and acceptance for the marginalized and support for Kyiv during Moscow's war.

Yet the cardinal of Hungary's Roman Catholic Church, Peter Erdo, as well as other members of the Catholic community, expect the pope's visit to be a celebration of Christian unity, and that differences of opinion won't play a central role.

"When there is a papal Mass to which bishops and priests from different countries come in large numbers, there is a feeling that the whole church is present there," Erdo said in an interview with The Associated Press. "He's making a pastoral visit to us specifically out of love and attention to the Hungarian Catholic community and the Hungarian people ... and I think this is a great joy."

Speaking after an Easter Mass celebrated by Erdo in Budapest, Erzsebet Markus, a believer from the capital, said Francis spending three full days in the country was "very significant" for Hungarian Christians and for Hungary at large.

"I think that he's spending so much time here represents an appreciation for us and for the country," she said.

Francis is also scheduled to visit with members of Hungary's scientific and cultural sectors. On his final day, he plans to preside over a Sunday Mass on a square in central Budapest.

But the war in Ukraine will loom large as he meets with some of the 35,000 Ukrainian refugees who have remained in Hungary after 2.5 million fled across the country's eastern borders early in the Russian invasion.

His trip is bringing Francis the closest he

has traveled to the conflict in Ukraine. His itinerary includes a stop at a Greek Catholic church that has provided care for refugees. The Greek Catholic Church is one of the eastern rite Catholic churches that recognizes papal authority.

The stop is a nod to Kyiv, which has begged for a papal visit of solidarity ever since Russia invaded, and is watching from the side as Francis visits neighboring Hungary for the second time in as many years.

"We'll be just a few hundred kilometers from the border with Ukraine," Vatican spokesman Matteo Bruni told reporters. "We can certainly expect words about his pain over this conflict and the search for peace."

Francis has been supportive of Ukraine's plight following Russia's invasion — likening it to a 1930s genocide of Ukrainians blamed on Soviet leader Joseph Stalin. Orban, meanwhile, has been lukewarm in his support for Hungary's eastern neighbor, refusing to supply Kyiv with weapons and threatening to veto European Union sanctions against Moscow.

Still, Orbán has cast his view of the war as being in line with the Vatican's, saying during a speech in February that his government and the papacy were the only powers in Europe advocating for peace in Ukraine.

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Kenyan President William Ruto on Monday compared the dozens of starvation deaths among the followers of a pastor in the south of the country with the results of terrorist acts, as the new death toll rose to 73.

He maintained that the pastor, Paul Makenzi, who is in police custody, should be in prison.

"What we are seeing ... is akin to terrorism," Ruto said. "Mr. Makenzi ... pretends and postures as a pastor when in fact he is a terrible criminal."

Makenzi was arrested on suspicion of telling his followers to fast to death in order to meet Jesus. A group of emaciated people were rescued alive, but some of them later died. Authorities then turned their attention to dozens of shallow graves marked with crosses on Makenzi's 800-acre ranch.

The total death toll now stands at 73, with 26 new bodies exhumed on Monday, Malindi subcounty police chief John Kemboi told the Associated Press.

Kemboi said investigators had received reinforcements and were able to cover more ground.

The Kenyan Red Cross Society on Sunday said 112 people had been reported missing at a tracing desk set up at Malindi, where the pastor's main church was located.

Ruto said he had instructed law enforcement agencies to thoroughly investigate the matter as a criminal case not linked to any religion.

Ruto, who was elected in 2022,

was hyped as the country's first evangelical Christian president and has not been shy about his faith, openly praying and weeping in churches before his election.

He has nominated several pastors into parliament and government agencies like the anticorruption commission.

Makenzi remains in custody and a court allowed investigators to hold him for two weeks as a probe into the deaths continues.

The pastor had been arrested twice before — in 2019 and in March of this year — in relation to the deaths of children. Each time, he was released on bond, and both cases are still proceeding through the court.

Local politicians have urged the court not to release him this time, decrying the spread of cults in the Malindi area.

Cults are common in Kenya, which has a largely religious society.

pope and the Hungarian government on refugees had seemed to be "diametrically opposed" in the past, there was not so much space between them on the war.

"On the issue of Russia's war of occupation in Ukraine, there seems to be no such diametric difference because the pope urges peace and the Hungarian government urges peace," Mate-Toth said.

Hungary's ambassador to the Holy See, Eduard Habsburg, acknowledged that the country remained highly dependent on Russian energy 14 months into the war, but said he believes that Orbán and Francis are of like minds when it comes to the conflict.

"Orbán and the pope, both very clearly over the last month, several times, have asked for an immediate cease-fire and peace negotiations," Habsburg said.

Francis has already expressed his appreciation for the welcome Hungary has shown to Ukrainian refugees. During a 2022 meeting with Orbán at the Vatican, Francis gave the prime minister a medallion of St. Martin and said he chose it specifically to honor Hungary's reception of people fleeing the war.

Such appreciation wasn't necessarily on display when Francis visited Budapest in 2021 for a seven-hour visit to close out a Eucharistic Congress. Francis didn't stay on to actually visit Hungary, which some observers perceived as a snub meant to reflect his opposition to Orbán's tough line on migration.

In remarks delivered at his Sunday noon blessing from his studio overlooking St. Peter's Square in the Vatican, Francis addressed his upcoming trip to Hungary, touching on both the war and migration as themes

that would play an elevated role during his visit.

"It will be an opportunity to reembrace a church and a people so dear to me. It will also be a journey to the center of Europe, over which icy winds of war continue to blow, while the movements of so many people place urgent humanitarian issues on the agenda," Francis said.

"Let us not forget our Ukrainian brothers and sisters still afflicted by this war," the pontiff said.

Yet despite the fraught backdrop of political friction and armed conflict, Francis will use his trip to make the kinds of visits with the downtrodden for which he is well known.

On Saturday, he will meet with patients at the Blessed Laszlo Batthyany-Strattmann Home for the Blind, an education and comprehensive care facility for children with visual and motor disabilities.

The director of the institute, György Inotay, said the pope's itinerary in Hungary is indicative of his commitment to the most vulnerable of society.

"He has obviously designated a program and path for himself that speaks to him feeling connected to the most desperate, the poorest and those struggling with some kind of illness and injury, and he has demonstrated this countless times over the last decade," Inotay said.



IndyRent returns: 6.8M available for Hoosiers facing eviction

IndyRent, the city's rental assistance program, will reopen for submissions April 27. The rebooting of IndyRent comes after a city-wide pause of rental assistance. Funding for this round of assistance currently sits at \$6.7 million.

During its early rounds of rental assistance, IndyRent did not require Hoosiers to be facing eviction to apply for funding. Prospective IndyRent applicants must now be facing an active eviction, a requirement implemented July 2022. Those requesting funding also cannot earn more than approximately \$65,500 per household of three. Seniors only receiving social

The online application and user interface for the IndyRent website have also been updated. Jeff Bennett, the senior policy advisor for the mayor's office, believes the update makes the process of applying for rental assistance easier.

Bennett also stated that the program's goal is to issue rental assistance within 30 days of an application submission.

Another change to the Indv-Rent program is that Hoosiers can now apply for up to six months of rental assistance per application. However, Hoosier cannot receive more than 12 months of rental assistance.

Landlords can streamline the rental assistance process by pre-registering their homes and

believe that this will accelerate the release of funds for qualifying tenants.

The funds that currently power IndyRent are a product of the national CARES Act. However, IndyRent staff believes that the funding from the CARES Act will evaporate by the end of this year.

Indianapolis is currently investigating modes of allocation for when the current round of funds is depleted.

Through its services, IndyPL offers trained librarians that can connect inventors to resources and answer questions about the patent and trademark process.

Ryan Donnely is one of the librarians at IndyPL helping inventors and entrepreneurs better understand their intellectual property needs. The program's specialized training involves patent and trademark research and can help entrepreneurs research their ideas, find free databases and determine if a trademark or patent already exists.

Books on these topics are available at select branch locations.

"Getting a patent or trademark can be complicated and expensive," Donnely said. "The resources we provide are free and low cost."



Indiana Lyons become **ABA Champions**

The 2022-23 Indiana Lyons, alongside the Burning River Buckets (Ohio), are Co-Champions of the American Basketball Association. The Lyons are the first American Basketball Association champions from Indiana in five decades. The last time a team from Indiana won the ABA title was when the Indiana Pacers secured the championship in 1973 before joining the National Basketball Association. The Indiana Lyons began the 2022-23 season with a concerning 1-4 record. However, they recovered from their subpar start, going on a 15-2 run and concluding their regular season with a 16-6 record and a No. 11 ranking in the last ABA power index. The Lyons defeated the Music City Jazz and Clarksville Phoenix in the ABA Midwest province playoffs, acquiring the title of 2022-23 Midwest Region champs and improving their record to 18-6. The Indiana Lyons were the No. 5 seed in the association's Final Eight tournament. The tournament features eight provincial winners fighting for one of the league's highest honors.

The Lyons bested the No. 4 seed Atlanta Aliens 121-107 April 13.

The following day, the Indiana Lyons faced one of the league's powerhouses: the Wyoming Valley Clutch. The Clutch was ranked No. 4 in the




